## SNOW WATER, TOO MUCH FEED AND FAST WIND SPELL DEFEAT FOR MANY KLAMATH FISHERMEN

The wind that comes from the east blows good for neither man nor beast.

And it was an east wind that whistled down Klamath canyon that was the alibi of some two or three score fishermen who failed to attract the attention of hefty rainbows of Klamath river.

Another alibi, probably the most plausible one, was that the Klamath river was filled to the brim with snow waters, which carried an abundance of feed down the river. At all events the few rainbows that were caught in Klamath river resembled hogs, ready for the market.

### Two Successful

Only their knowledge of the history of every trout family in Klamath river, enabled Dr. E. D. Lamb and Dr. Hardin Carter to "bring home the bacon." For an hour and a half the two men had excellent fishing, with crawfish as bait. They brought in a little short of a score.

Way on down the river, below McCollum's mill and even past the Kesler Poultry ranch, a couple of dozen enthusiastic anglers stumbled over the big rocks, fell in and climbed out of the river, throughout the day. Only two fishermen had any success in this section of the river. They pushed way on

down the river, far beyond the main regiment of anglers and in a series of small riffles and whirlpool that preceded a sudden drop into a big pool, pulled out 15 or 20 big fighting rainbows.

### Water Murky

Williamson river and Sprague river were reported in poor condition for fishing. The waters of the river were murky from the snow water and the stream was too high for good fishing.

A few fishermen who believed in taking a chance, bumped their way over the Rock creek road and tried Rock creek. Nor were their efforts in vain. One party included H. E. Calkins, Dr. Paul M. Noel and Glen Jester. The party caught thirty or forty of the small eastern brook trout that the small stream is noted for.

Good weather during the latter part of last week, dried up roads sufficient to insure easy access to most of the streams dear to the fisherman's heart. Several parties were able to make their way to Bly and the Sprague river valley country without much trouble.

### Everybody Holidays

Everybody that owned a machine and many that didn't were out for an outing yesterday. As one fisher-

man, Warren Frauts, put it: "Shucks, I knew I wouldn't have any luck, but I just had to get out in the open and wet a hook, anyway."

Frauts with two nice trout in his creel, then relapsed into philosophical silence as he contemplated his line twisting and turning, as it was carried into the deeper reaches of the pool.

General consensus of opinion of the old time fishermen, who have fished Klamath streams for years, is that the season is too early. Along in the middle of May or even the first part of June, the fishing will be at its best. The snow waters must run off, the streams clear and then fly casting will be in vogue. Now it is bait plugging, spoon throwing, or plug casting.

## COMMISSIONERS DEFER ACTION ON RE-LOCATION

Once again the state highway commission has postponed the solution of the problem of re-locating the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway between Dairy and Beatty, County Commissioner Burrell Short said Saturday on his return from Portland where he and County Judge R. H. Bunnell attended the state highway commission meeting Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. "The commission set the date ahead till their next meeting in May

for announcement of their decision on the matter," Mr. Short said. "Nothing was done on the matter at this meeting."

The commission is faced with allowing the present route, Dairy to Bonanza to Beatty, to remain the highway route, or with relocating the highway by leaving the present highway several miles east of Dairy and striking off direct to Beatty. The latter route is held by some authorities to be the more logical road owing to the lower maintenance cost.

Advocates of the Dairy-Bonanza-Beatty or "Let Well Enough Alone" party contend that inasmuch as the

highway is all ready built to Bonanza, that it would be poor policy to not continue the road construction onto Beatty from Bonanza. If,

they say, the other route were to be taken, several miles of state highway system would be taken off the primary road system.
