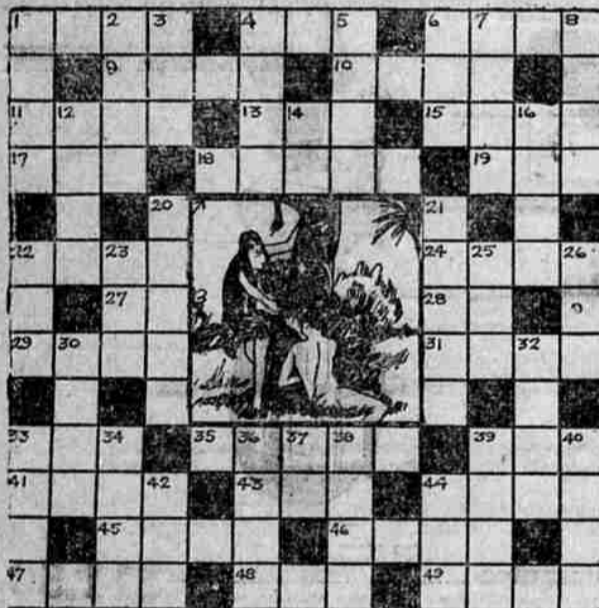

Restrictive Forest Fires

Here is what a few forest fires have done in the past. In 1871 the Peshtigo fire in Wisconsin burned 1,200,000 acres of timber and cost 1500 lives. In 1881 another fire in Michigan burned 1,000,000 acres and cost 138 lives. In the spring of 1894 the Phillius, Wisconsin, fire burned to death over 300 human beings. In the fall of the same year in Minnesota, fire ran over millions of acres in that state and in Wisconsin, devastated the towns of Hinckley, Sandstone, Barronnet, Perley, Clayton, Shell Lake, Cumberland and Granite Lake, and killed over 400 people. In 1918 the terrible Cloquet, Minnesota, fire turned \$30,000,000 worth of timber and property into ashes and cost over 400 lives. In 1922 millions of dollars worth of privately-owned timber and logging equipment were destroyed in Washington and Idaho. In 1924 many sections of the Pacific coast, notably California, experienced unusually severe fires. In California alone about 500,000 acres were swept by flames. The money loss in timber, recreation and watershed protection ran into many millions of dollars.

Separating fighters. More serious trouble occurred at Karlsruhe, where two persons were killed and a number wounded in a clash between republicans and nationalists.

Riots Occur
Disturbances also took place at Rattbor, in Silesia, when an or-

roneous announcement was published to the effect that Dr. Marx was leading Von Hindenburg by nearly two million votes. The nationalists, roused by this, gathered and began marching through the streets. Dispersed by the police, they obtained reinforcements and besieged the police stations in vari-

ous towns in the area. Scores of arrests were made.

ROTARIANS GUESTS OF COPCO OFFICERS
The California Oregon Power company was host yesterday after-

noon to Rotarians of southern Oregon at Copco dam on the Klamath river and the site of the new power dam now under construction.

Delegations from the Rotary clubs of Klamath Falls, Medford, Grants Pass and Ashland met at the power dam and were taken through the Copco dam and the new plant during the afternoon.

The Rotarians first visited Copco dam and at that point ate a light lunch. After going through the plant the party proceeded to the new dam, which will be in operation by July 1. A large banquet was served there at 4 p. m., following which the party disbanded.
