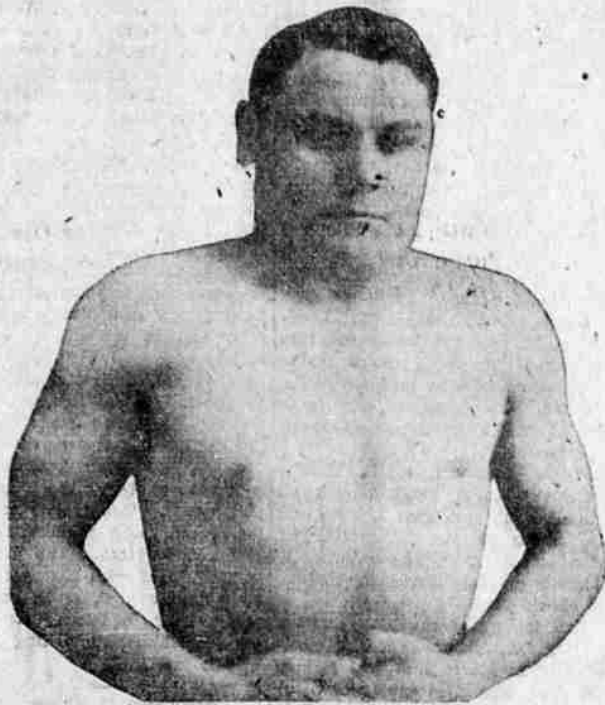
Uriah Palmer, of Chico, Cal., formerly a Tennant resident, was here Wednesday and Thursday shaking hands with old friends and neighbors.
