

O. A. C. BUYS TIMBERED AREA FOR ARBORETUM

Experiments to be Conducted in Growing Hard and Soft Woods

Regents of the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, at the April meeting of the board purchased 331 acres of land eight miles from Corvallis for use as an arboretum. The land carries a good stand of second-growth Douglas fir, interspersed with oak, madrone and other species common to the Willamette Valley. It is the contemplated purpose of the forestry school to carry forward experiments in the growing of redwood, Port Orford cedar, western pine, walnut and other hardwoods. One of the very interesting studies is the crowding out of the oak by the Douglas fir. The soil and location of the tract is ideal for carrying forward intensive experiments in forest growth. A compact tract of some 77,000 acres of state lands in Douglas county, tributary to Reedsport in the Umpqua watershed made possible through an exchange with the government of scattered state lands, will be turned over to the Forestry Department of the Oregon Agricultural College to administer. The tract contains a varied growth of timber and will make at once possible the practice of technical forestry on a commercial scale. Dean George W. Peary deserves a very great deal of credit for his unflagging zeal in securing for the forestry school facilities which will enable the carrying forward of studies in the broader phase of forestry heretofore impossible. The lumber industry of Oregon, which has more standing timber than any other state in the Union, has up to this time failed to fully appreciate the significance of the need of training young men along scientific lines. The forestry schools of Oregon, Washington, California, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia are each carrying splendid forestry courses, despite the fact they are literally starved for funds. The industry owes it to itself to see that the legislatures deal more liberally in the future with these forest schools.
