BUS SCHEDULES QUESTION FIXED

H. H. Corey, Public Service Commissioner, Leaves Klamath Today

Hereafter, buses operating out of Klamath Falls to Chiloquin, Bend and way points, will have the public convenience and safety in mind, more than in the past, H. H. Corey, chairman of the state public service commission announced this morning, just prior to his departure for Salem.

"Buses will not leave at the same hour for a given point," Mr. Corey said. "Therefore racing on the highways will be obviated."

"The trouble we have had is to impress upon these public carriers of forgetting their private fights, and think only of the public good. This cutting of rates and jockeying of schedules, has to be stopped. The sooner bus men realize that their own interest and the public interest can best be served by less fighting and more cooperation, the better it will be for all concerned."

Mr. Corey has been in Klamath Falls for the past five days interviewing Klamath Falls auto bus men, in an endeavor to straighten out schedule and rate issues. He was accompanied by Percy Varney, former state parole officer and now field representative for the commission. Mr. Varney returned last night from Bend after conferring with bus men of that city relative to rates and schedules.
