Among the relics that will pass with the razing of the garden on Wednesday, will be John Sullivan, a night caretaker, who for 32 years has seen the champions come and go. Sullivan, who said he had not missed a single night's work since he entered upon his long assignment, asserted that of all the thrilling struggles he had ever seen, that between Peter Maher and Gus Ruhlin topped the list.

"It was the bloodiest battle ever staged in New York," declared the ancient caretaker. "The eyes of both men were closed in the middle of the fray, and how they ever lasted it out I could never understand."

BETTER SEWAGE SYSTEM NEEDED

Bus Franchise Up for Final Passage in 90 Days—Dr. Newsom Talks

Klamath Falls has arrived at the point in its development when attention must be directed toward creating some definite plan of sewer service, and follow that plan in the future.

This was the opinion of city councilmen last night, when Dr. G. S. Newsom and Mayor Goddard urged the council to take some steps to alleviate the bad sewage disposal system in Fairview addition and adjacent sections of town.

As Dr. Newsom put it, the cess pool system was inadequate for the section and in several instances the sewage would run off down the hill instead of being absorbed in the ground.

"To be honest with the council, I have feared a typhoid epidemic in that section and hardly know how to compete with it until I talk it over with the council," Dr. Newsom pointed out.

"I understand plans have been completed for the construction of a sewer affecting the district I mention. It would be built by next year. Well, it would be hard for me to enforce all those people out there to build septic tanks at a cost of \$100 each when the following year they would have a sewer system and the septic tank would be useless."

"What would the council think of hiring a special sanitary engineer to look over the situation and make recommendations," Councilman Charles Roberts, wanted to know.

The remainder of the council favored the suggestion, and incidentally, all expressed belief that the time had come when something had to be done toward increased efficiency of the city sewer system.

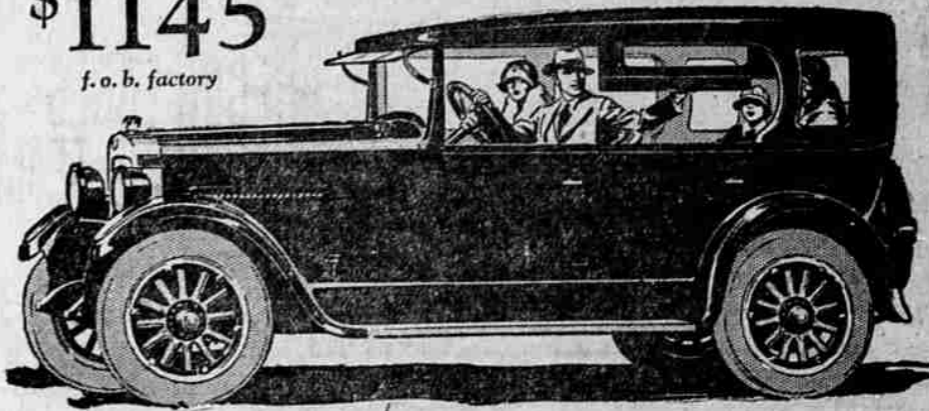

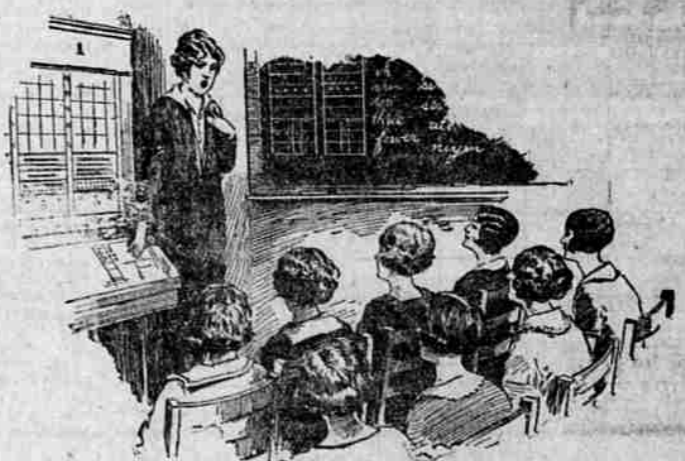
How to secure the necessary water on the national forest and thereby increase the number of sheep that can be grazed, will be delved into.

One proposition that will be suggested is to ask the government to drill a test well in the Lava bed country to ascertain whether or not water is available through that agency. In event well drilling

would prove feasible, the sheep men would drill their own wells.
