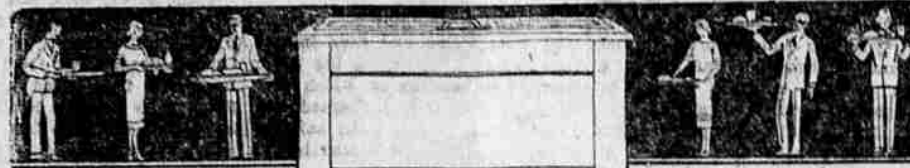

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## Convicted as Revolutionists



Paul Crouch (right) and Walter M. Trumbull, Service Company, 21st Infantry, Schofield Barracks, T. H., were sentenced to prison for 40 and 20 years respectively when found guilty by a court-martial of attempting to introduce revolutionary communism among soldiers in Hawaii.

Monday morning between 12 and 1. Martha Margaret Merrill was born in Merrill, Nov. 16, 1910, and had lived in Merrill practically all her life. She had spent some time however in Oakland, Calif., with relatives. She was a freshman in the high school and was one of the most attractive as well as one of the most popular girls in school. Her untimely death was a great shock to her many friends and to the friends of her parents, who are left childless by her death, a son having died in infancy many years ago. The body will leave Wednesday for Redding where burial will take place, beside the brother.
