MEXICO CITY, May 6.—Adoption of a commercial arbitration agreement by the National Chamber of Commerce of Washington and the Confederation of Mexican Chambers of Commerce is recommended by a special committee named by the Mexican confederation. The plan recommended to settle, without recourse to the courts, differences between Mexican and United States business houses follows; virtually without change the American-Argentine agreement. It will be voted on at the next meeting of confederation.

**COWEN GETS TWO
MONTHS IN JAIL**

Sixty days in the county jail was the package handed to McKinley Cowen by Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker yesterday, following Cowen's conviction in justice court on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor.

**TEST AVIATORS
BY PSYCHOLOGY**

SAN PEDRO, Calif., May 6.—Flight psychanalysis, practiced to prevent aerial accidents, rather than mend broken bones or patch up luckless pilots and observers after a crash, if they survive, has increased the efficiency of United States naval aviators to a large degree, statistics aboard the U. S. S. Aroostook, naval aircraft tender, indicate.

Medical officers aboard the tender declare that 90 per cent of aerial accidents during the World War were due to physical psychological defects of the flying personnel. Acting upon this percentage compiled from fatalities, the medical staff of the Aroostook has established a careful examination, scientific in every detail, over the 150 pilots and observers, who took-off in heavy bombers or light scout planes from the long, flat deck of the tender.

Fliers Observed
The flight surgeons observe the fliers each time before a flight is begun.

"I can tell by talking with a pilot in the morning," declared Dr. Robert G. Davis, senior flight surgeon, "whether he is able to go aloft that day. If his psychological condition seems shaky he has to stay aboard."

"We will not permit a man to fly who has domestic difficulties, or if his family objects to his going aloft. At the critical moment a pilot's mind may wander to what his wife said at breakfast and he ends in a fatal crash."

Must Be Examined
When an ensign is assigned to the Aroostook for flight duty, he first must be in 100 percent physical condition; then he is subjected to a most searching psychological examination, Dr. Davis explained. Visual balance, visual muscle balance, and tests of depth perception from the basis of the applicant's examination trial before he is awarded wings.

**Decorations on "Veneitan"
Arrive in Klamath Falls
This Week**

"Veneitan," the dance barge to be put into the waters of Lake Ewanna for the summer's use, will not be ready for Saturday night. Frank Confer, a member of the company building the dance barge, made the announcement today after numerous inquiries had been made in regard to when the barge would be put in the water for use.

"However," said Confer, "the barge will be ready for its initial trip on Tuesday night and several interesting features have been planned for the opening night. The first trip into the lake will begin at 9 p. m. or 9:15 p. m. After that patrons arriving late will be taken to the barge by a smaller boat which will tow the barge back to its moorings later in the evening."

The boat is now in Lake Ewanna, fast nearing completion. The latest reports from the ship yards today reported the floor will be laid before Saturday afternoon. Extra carpenters and help have been hired to speed the work along. Awnings and decorations arrived this week from the south and are being put on the barge as fast as possible, according to Confer. Houston's "Aggravators" will be on the barge three nights a week during the summer.
