ter were obdurate also, so Crawford withdrew his patronage from the infirmary.

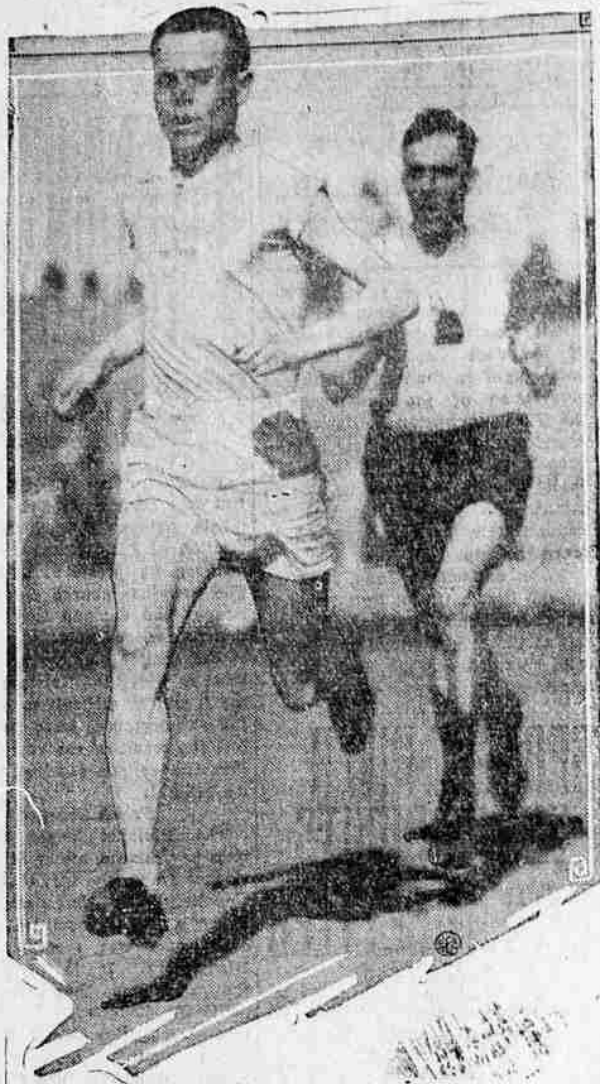
BRITISH ADMIRAL DIES

CALGARY, Alta., May 7.—W. H. Fletcher of Brant, Alberta, has written the department of agriculture of the province that far from encouraging slaughter of coyotes, which has long been a provincial policy, the killing of one of these animals should be made a crime.

Britons Growing Shorter According to Scientist

LONDON, May 7.—Europeans of the present day have smaller brains than formerly, according to Sir Arthur Keith, conservator of the Royal College of Surgeons' Museum, and England's best known anthropologist.

In a lecture on man's evolution at the Royal Institute recently Sir Arthur said that from the limited data at the disposal of scientists, it may be inferred that the people who occupied western Europe at the close of the Ice Age stood distinctly above their successors of today in the matter of the size of their brains.

Referring to the height of man, the speaker said it was evident that the mean height of the modern Englishman was five feet six inches, not five feet eight, as has been supposed for many years.

CHAMBER REQUESTS WIRE TO PORTLAND

Delay to wire messages during the peak of business in the summer months, often means embarrassment and inconvenience to business men. It has been reported to the chamber of commerce, and to supply a long felt need, Secretary Lynn Sabin has written the Western Union company at Seattle requesting a direct wire to Portland instead of a relay wire to Portland via San Francisco. The relay wire delays messages from 10 minutes to one half hour, it is held.

Condemnation of three downtown structures, declared to be fire traps, will be asked at the Monday night meeting of the city council by Fire Chief Keith Ambrose.

PNEUMONIA FATAL TO BRITISH PEER

LONDON, May 7.—Viscount Leverhulme, industrial leader and multimillionaire "soap king" succumbed to pneumonia at 4:30 o'clock this morning after a brief illness. He was 74 years old. As William Haskell Lever, he started work in his youth as a soap cutter, but within a few years founded a small factory of his own and built up the business until his enterprises assumed world wide importance. He was raised to the peerage in 1922, and combining his wife's maiden name—Hulme—with his own, became Viscount Leverhulme.
