TROUT UNABLE TO JUMP DAM

Many Game Fish Congregated in Spillway in Link River

Thousands of trout in Link river, are literally speaking, up against a stone wall. Hour after hour trout striving to get past the Link river dam and to streams in northern Klamath, to spawn, hurl themselves out of the water at the dam and crash against the concrete side of the dam. The spillway at the dam is full of trout. They are congregated at the upper end of the spillway near the headgates, and the powerful current at one place catches them and throws them violently against the side of the dam.

Can't Get By The contention of sportsmen that trout can not swim through the head gates is supported by the effort of trout to jump over the dam, according to reports. Whether or not the buffers that that trout receive by the current and the bruises they receive in plunging headlong through the air against the side of the dam, result in killing off trout, could not be learned.

Copco Willing Construction of a fish ladder over the Link river dam has been under consideration for some time. The California Oregon Power company, owner of the dam, has announced on frequent occasions, that whenever the game commission submits plans to them for the construction of the dam that they will build the fish ladder.

Unable to spawn in natural spawning streams, the trout will probably deposit eggs in Link river. Schools of mullets and suckers that

have followed the trout on their annual spring run to spawning grounds, will consume the greater part of eggs, game authorities declare.

The trout in the spillway range from six inches to thirty-six. One trout was seen jumping yesterday afternoon that weighed between 15 and 20 pounds.
