

CHAMBER MEETS WITH RANGERS OF FORT REGION

Head of Wood River Valley Told by James Pelton; Sisemore, Chairman

Only forty families live on 10,000 acres of fine irrigated land, in the northern Klamath basin, chamber of commerce members were told last night at the chamber caravan dinner in Fort Klamath.

It was James Pelton, pioneer rancher of the fertile section, who enlightened the Klamath Falls delegation on the agricultural situation in northern Klamath.

He pointed out what the future for the Fort Klamath country is, if only more people would settle there; particularly dairymen. With \$10,000 head of dairy cattle, an annual gross income of \$1,000,000 would be assured.

R. C. Groesbeck, vice-president of the chamber, explained to the Fort Klamath folk the purpose of the caravan dinners. He pointed out that the aim of the chamber was to bind the Klamath communities into a solid organization, striving for the prosperity of the Klamath country.

Other features of the program were an address by Professor Youell on development of the Fort Klamath country and how the chamber could help ranchers; several songs by Frank Conner; and a delightful program by Fort Klamath school children, under the direction of Mrs. T. J. Evans.

After the program the Fort Klamath people and the personnel of the chamber caravan repaired to the community hall to dance the remainder of the evening.

L. C. Sisemore was chairman at the dinner.

Slayer of Grand Duke Loses Life in Airplane

RIGA, May 7.—Miasnikoff, the Bolshevik commissary who in 1918 was commissioned to do away with Grand Duke Michael, recently was killed in an airplane accident, it is reported from Leningrad.

Carrying out the assignment of royal assassination, Miasnikoff went to Perm and managed to be admitted to the grand duke on the pretext that he was sent by a secret society of aristocrats to conduct the grand duke to Siberia and thence to safety in England.

The grand duke's English secretary, Harry Johnston, becoming suspicious, warned his employer, but Miasnikoff succeeded in abducting both in two automobiles and as they were passing a forest he and his agents are said to have murdered the grand duke and his secretary.

FOSDICK CASE STARTS AGAIN

COLUMBUS, O., May 7. — The case of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, Baptist minister, who recently vacated the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church of New York City at the request of the Presbyterian General Assembly, again will be the center of controversy when the assembly convenes for its 137th annual session here the week beginning May 21.

The Fosdick dispute arose at last year's session over the question of his orthodoxy. His opponents succeeded in getting the assembly to vote for the termination of his relationship with the Presbyterian church. Immediate action, however, was not taken by the New York presbytery and it was this delay that is expected to bring comment by a faction of the assembly headed by Dr. Walter D. Buchanan, pastor of Broadway Presbyterian church, New York.

Dr. Buchanan and his associates also will bring other cases against the New York presbytery. It is announced here, charging that it has licensed young ministers to preach who do not believe in the Virgin Birth, the miracles of Christ, and other fundamentals of the New Testament. These cases will be tried in executive session by the judicial commission, a separate body which sits apart from the general assembly. If the assembly does not accept the findings of the commission the case at issue will be tried before the assembly.

The first test of the strength of the fundamentalists and the liberals will come on the election of a moderator at the opening session. The fundamentalists won last year, electing as moderator Dr. Clarence Edward Macartney, pastor of Arch Street Presbyterian church, Philadelphia. Dr. Macartney was credited with being mainly responsible for the bringing to a head of the charges against the New York presbytery concerning Dr. Fosdick.

The fundamentalists this year are expected to support Dr. Lapsley A. McAfee of Berkeley, Cal. William Jennings Bryan, representing the Florida presbytery, could have the nomination for moderator on behalf of the fundamentalists, but refuses to stand for the office representing a divided church, according to the view here. Another likely candidate for moderator is Dr. William O. Thompson of Columbus, president of Ohio State university. He has been for 25 years in this office.

The Presbyterian General Assembly will be officially attended by 1,000 newly elected commissioners from the 299 presbyteries throughout the United States and by board secretaries and other officials totaling nearly 2,000.

Annual reports will be submitted by all the boards and agencies. A special committee headed by Dr. Joseph A. Vance of Detroit, Mich., will present a report for a plan systematizing the finances of the denomination into one unified method in the interests of economy and efficiency.

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Women's Club Comes Out Against Woman Governor

BALTIMORE, May 7.—A proposal to nominate a woman for governor of Maryland is meeting with strong opposition from women. An effort at a recent convention of the United Democratic Women's clubs of the state at Salisbury to obtain the endorsement of Mrs. W. W. Hubbard, of Chastertown, for the gubernatorial honor, failed and subsequently the Baltimore Federation of Democratic Women put its official stamp of disapproval on the nomination of women candidates for the office.

The federation resolved "that there be recorded as the unanimous sense of the Federation of Democratic Woman, Incorporated of Baltimore, in view of the recent public reports with respect to the nomination of a woman for governor of Maryland, the federation's emphatic opposition to the ill-timed and hasty thought giving rise to this ambitious proposal."

Rio Eager for Steamers With American Tourists

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, May 7.—Rare the tourist who does not leave Brazil with a souvenir in the shape of a semi-precious stone or the colorful wing of a butterfly. Some buy the stones in large numbers, for a local jeweler declares he has sold approximately 4,000 aquamarines, for about \$20,000, to the 35 Americans on board a tourist steamer recently in this harbor. Large blue butterfly wings, the Mosapho, mounted in glass trays, sell at the rate of about 10,000 pair a year, and there is a steady market for the blue beetles mounted as keepsakes.

There are no professional butterfly hunters in Brazil, the supply of wings for the tourist trade coming from poor people and children living in the interior.
