

POLITICS MAY LOSE KLAMATH GUARD COMPANY

General White Deplores Action of Legion; Appraisal Job Cause

As long as opposition to establishment of a National Guard company in Klamath Falls is manifest in the local American Legion, this city will not be granted a company. It was received here yesterday by Captain George A. Proctor Jr. from George A. White, brigadier general, and in charge of the National Guard in Oregon.

Mr. White, in his communication, expressed regret that his failure to aid in securing the appointment of H. E. Getz as Klamath appraiser or state bonus loans, should be the foundation of the local post's veto of the National Guard company proposal.

Must Stop Bickering

"Frankly, I have held the hope that an infantry company would ultimately be formed and mustered in at Klamath Falls," Mr. White said. "The Legion post asked us for a company some months ago and it was a matter of deep regret that no company was available at the time. There is no company at the present moment for assignment. In course of time, we expect to receive authority from the Federal Government to muster four additional companies. Some twenty communities are on the application list for these companies, and you will appreciate, therefore, that it would be very unwise for the General Staff to allot one of these companies to any community where there was an element of opposition, no matter whether the opposition were honest misunderstanding of the new National Defense law or otherwise.

"Personally it is my belief that Klamath Falls ex-service men are just as intensely patriotic, and the American Legion membership as a whole just as wholeheartedly be-

hind the National Defense, as those of any other community. I believe that if a company were available that the Klamath Falls post, were the matter put squarely up to the whole membership in its true light, would overwhelmingly support the company. However, as I have said, with twenty communities after companies and only four in prospect, the General Staff would hardly be inclined to involve itself in any sort of controversy over this matter."

Unable To See Connection

General White was unable to see the connection between political appointments and the National Guard company.

"Just what connection exists between political appointments for post officials and the building up of our national defense is not quite clear, nor is it believed that any such connection harmonizes with the basic principals and universal ideals of the American Legion," he wrote. "In fact such an action is so utterly foreign to the American Legion that we can only conclude that the inspiring name of this great institution is being misused."

The Chilean was apparently outclassed from the start, and his blows in the first round were ineffective. He was badly punished in the next round, suffering two knockdowns in the third, and fought blindly in the fourth round after a third flooring, until the referee stopped the bout and gave Stribling the decision.
