### MUSHROOMS MAKE DEBUT IN MARKET AFTER SOFT RAIN

First mushrooms of the season have appeared in Klamath Falls markets. Brought in by an energetic rancher from the Midland district, a box of the delicate food has made its debut in a Klamath Falls store where they may be purchased fresh from the sweet smelling earth. The rain Wednesday, the first during the week, has shot the mushrooms from the ground overnight and the party that went out last week will probably have better luck should they try them again.

Proper preparation of mushrooms have been learned through an old "darkie" cook, whose favorite dish was a tender steak smothered in mushrooms. Scrubbing the food of dirt and accumulation from the with a stiff brush, takes all particles interested in the plant. Although there is some difference of opinion the best results from the food is to soak them for 24 hours in a salt water solution after slicing

them in thin slices and then dry in a court to take up as much moisture as possible. A pan heated to a temperature that butter will melt instantly is used to fry the mushrooms, with a deep amount of butter in the frying pan. When a rich grown liquor has been obtained, add a little flour to make a sauce of gravy.

According to several prominent housewives, the mushroom preparation is not only delicious on steak, but Warrenton clams, oysters and well browned toast also forms a basis for an appetizing meal.

### ROY KLEIN SEES GREAT HIGHWAY EXPANSION HERE

State Highway Engineer and Aide Are in Klamath on Inspection

Completion of The Dalles-Cullifornia highway from the northern border of the state to the southern border, is assured by the fall of 1926, Roy Klein, state highway engineer, asserted today. Mr. Klein, with Assistant State Engineer L. P. Campbell, arrived last night from Shlem to spend several days in Klamath county inspecting state highways in Klamath and Lake counties.

Concurrent construction on the Klamath Falls - Lakeview highway in both Klamath and Lake counties is also assured, the state engineer said.

**Outlines Work**  
Mr. Klein outlined in detail different units of construction on The Dalles-Cullifornia highway in Klamath and Deschutes county that will be projected this year and next.

Surfacing of the Sand Creek-Beaver Marsh section is now under way and will be completed this year. The grading of this section was finished in 1924.

The Beaver Marsh-Crescent section will be graded this year by the forest service. The grade will be allowed to settle over the winter and contract for the surfacing of the road will be let in the spring of 1926.

Grading contract for the section extending from Crescent north to the Klamath-Deschutes county line will be let at the next meeting of the state highway commission, May 28.

The grading and surfacing of the La Pino-Lava Butte section—the only incomplete section in Deschutes county—will be finished this year.

#### Government To Help

Mr. Klein told of an agreement with the Lake county court, which will facilitate completion of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. According to agreement, if the state and United Forest service will cooperate on a 50-50 basis, on the grading and surfacing of the section of the highway that goes through Fremont National forest in eastern Klamath and western Lake counties, the Lake county court will complete grading of the highway from Drews Valley east to Lakeview.

"The forest service is willing to go half and half in building the road through the national forest", Mr.

#### Silent on Relocation

"It is true that we will look over the proposition", he admitted, "but after all it is a problem for the highway commission. The engineering department can only make recommendations." The commission will probably make a decision on this question at their next meeting, May 28.

### ISLANDS ROCKED BY EARTHQUAKE

Tremors Reported Far Out on Pacific—Several Buildings Cracked

MANILA, May 8.—A new series of earthquakes having their origin "far out in the Pacific Ocean" shook Albay, Samar and Camarines provinces this morning.

Dispatches received from Bais, Occidental Negros Island, report the wharf there was badly damaged by the tremors preventing ships from landing.

A floodtide during the day was also caused by the shocks, it was believed.

Father Selga, director of the weather bureau, emphasized his belief that geologic disturbances in the Pacific caused the latest tremors and they were in no way connected with the volcanic activity, being anticipated by the residents of the town of Bais.

The Batag lighthouse, the most eastern point in the Philippines felt

the tremors, the record there showing the shocks as of intensity four and five.

The city of Dalaguete, Cebu province, reports a number of concrete buildings there were cracked by the earthquakes. No loss of life was reported in any region.
