MT. HOOD LODGE FORMALLY OPENS

"Come to Mt. Hood and see Rainer" is the slogan of Oregonians since the opening of Mt. Hood lodge on May 1. Blessed with clear weather practically the entire summer, visitors to the lodge who have motored down from Washington without catching a glimpse of Mt. Rainer are surprised when they step out on the veranda of Mt. Hood lodge to see the snow covered monarch in all its glory.

Being located near the ocean Rainer often hides its head for days under a mantle of cloud and fog. Indications for travel to Mt. Hood this summer point to a larger number of visitors than ever before. With the opening of the new Mt. Hood loop road motorists can now drive all the way around the mountain, visiting Government camp and stopping at Mt. Hood lodge.

Homer Rogers, manager of the lodge, is really the "father" of the fine new highway. Twelve years ago he suggested the idea of a good motor road encircling the mountain to Rufus Holman, who was then chairman of the county commission. Mr. Holman gives full credit to Mr. Rogers and Mt. Hood lodge for having been largely instrumental in establishing the loop road.

Horseback riding, hiking, golfing and mountain climbing are among the attractions offered guests at the lodge, expert guides and horses being provided. Mr. Rogers himself is an experienced mountain climber, having spent much time in the Swiss Alps.

Literary Department to Review Two Well Known Books

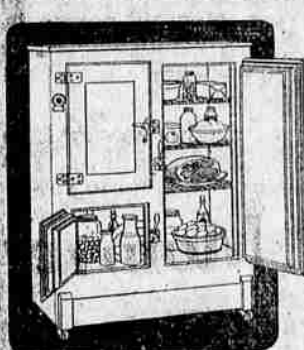
