4L EMPLOYMENT SERVICE REPORT

PORTLAND, May 11.—Continued short-week operation of a large number of fir mills and the resultant accumulation of logs in many districts, last week brought about a further curtailment of logging operations, according to reports from 4L employment service offices in various northwestern cities received at 4L headquarters here today.

The general trend of employment is upward, however, as most loggers recently laid off are finding work in other industries.

Rivers drives in the Inland Empire are finished and summer logging is well under way.

PORTLAND.—Calls for loggers and for farm help headed last week demand for men. Labor turnover in the camps is heavy.

RAYMOND, Wn.—Due to an over supply of logs on Willapa Harbor, Camp 13 of the Sunset Timber company and Camp Bort of the Raymond Lumber company have been closed.

ABERDEEN, Wn.—Curtailment of lumber production in many Grays Harbor sawmills has caused an accumulation of logs in this district, and logging operators last week started to trim their output to meet demand.

TACOMA.—Fallers and buckers have been laid off at some camps in this district. Curtailment of lumber production is continuing here and it has brought about a surplus of logs.

SEATTLE.—Curtailment of logging operations in Puget Sound districts is spreading.

Timber company has ceased all operations. Construction and building work within the city is increasing and this work has required a large number of additional men during the past week.

SPOKANE.—Skilled sawmill and planing mill help are getting scarce. Men for any kind of work are not so plentiful as they were earlier in the year and it is now possible to get a job at any time.

FARMS AND FOREST FIRES

The continued productivity of any irrigated region is dependent upon its water supply.

The results of watershed denudation are well known. Without the protective forest cover the winter snows melt quickly and the water rushes down the stream courses, carrying tons of silt which fills the reservoirs and ditches.

The most destructive agency of the forest cover on the watersheds is forest fires.

Lumbering on the watersheds is not destructive if proper cutting methods are practiced.

Every precaution is taken to lessen the fire hazard on the logging units. Thus, if a constant and plentiful supply of water is to be maintained fires must be kept out of the watersheds.

BEND MILLS PILING A LARGE PERCENTAGE OF CUT IN THE YARD

BEND, Ore.—Large yards in which to store lumber is the chief reason for the fact that the Bend sawmills are able to continue operation at capacity production.

"The tidewater mills do not have large yards because the lumber is shipped at once, going almost from the saw into the boat.

"We are enabled to cut the logs to better advantage because they are not being cut for particular orders waiting to be shipped out.

The fact that Bend sawmills, Brooks-Scanlon and Shevlin-Hixon Co., are large concerns has been cited as one reason why they were able to continue at capacity production despite curtailed shipments.

The fact that the town of Bend is largely dependent upon the sawmills has been recognized by the Brooks-Scanlon Co., Mr. Allen pointed out, and said that being interested in its welfare, the sawmill had never shut down since it opened here and production has been only curtailed at intervals and for a short time.

Absence of labor troubles in Bend which have affected other sawmill towns in the state, was attributed to the steady operation of the mills by Mr. Allen.

A slight pickling up in demand is reported at the present time.
