JUDGES FAIL TO AGREE ON MEET

Ineligibility of Entrants Counted as Reason for Awarding Points

To Central school of Klamath Falls goes the honor of winning the first Klamath county field and track meet in the grade school division in which more than 540 entrants were enlisted, it was learned late this afternoon. Garrett Beckley, eighth grade student of Central school was high point man with 13 points to his credit. Beckley will receive a medal from the track association.

To Vera Seeds, little fifth grade pupil, goes the honor of high point girl of the meet.

Riverside won the boys' relay and was awarded a pennant while Central school girls won the relay in their division, also gaining a pennant.

Central school will be given a silver loving cup for her victorious activities in the meet.

Controversy over the eligibility of entrants into the Klamath county field and track meet held on Saturday in the fairgrounds, makes it impossible for the winners of the grade school section to be announced, according to announcement.

Merrill high school won the first annual track meet with a score of 67 points. Henley high school came to a close second with 45 points while Malin registered third with 24 points. Fort Klamath placed fourth in the meet with points while the little Bonanza high school placed fifth with one point to her credit. Merrill boys won the relay race while the Malin girls crossed the tape first in the girls relay.

The highest number of points won by any girl in the grade school division were awarded to Vera Seeds of Central school. Grade school boys victor could not be determined.

Among the high school girls Lenna Sargent of Fort Klamath, Julie Kos of Malin and Cleo Graybael of Merrill tied for high honors, each having a score of five points.

Out of a possible score of 20, aggregating from the entrants made by Earl Jackson of Henley, he came out with 18 of the 45 points won by the entire Henley high school entrants. Jackson was recorded high point man of the meet.

Although the first annual county field and track meet held in Klamath, the affair was said to have been most successful. More than 540 boys and girls from the grade schools entered the meet while 74 high school boys and girls qualified for the day.

QUIET SESSION OF COURT HELD

SHEIDLER GETS NEW PARK JOB

Local Man to Be Caretaker of City Recreation Grounds

Responsibility for the care and maintenance of city parks in Klamath Falls now rests upon the shoulders of H. G. Sheidler, well known local man, who has been appointed caretaker for the parks by the city park board.

The position was created when it appeared that the city parks were in need of constant attention. Mr. Sheidler's duties will include keeping up general repair work and minor improvements.

SKOOKUM SOON TO LOSE NAME; TO BE PAUNINA

BEND, May 11.—Paunina is the name given the station on the Natron cut-off near Corral Springs and known for several months as Skookum. The town is the headquarters for the railroad engineers, a number of stores and restaurants.

Panton is the name given the station at the west end of the tunnel, formerly known merely as Tunnel station. The station at the southwest end of the lake will be known as Odell Lake.

Final completion of the tunnel work is expected by July 15 under present plans, according to word from Odell Lake. The two tunnels one from the west and one from the east side of the Cascades are expected to meet within about one month's time.

YREKA EXCITED OVER BIG COAL STRIKE SUNDAY

YREKA, Calif., May 11.—Northern California is excited today over the striking of an 11 foot ledge of Bituminous Coking coal on the John E. Cooley ranch, several miles north of Yreka, following months of development work. The coal was struck after drilling 121 feet thru a sandstone formation and it was struck between the hanging wall and the foot wall.

Following the strike, the drill was pulled and further work will be held in abeyance until a shaft is sunk. Machinery needed for this is in transit.

HARRY HAMILTON FORESTALLS PLEA

Harry Hamilton, former proprietor of a used car exchange of this city and indicted by the grand jury on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, took the first step today in a fight for freedom when he demurred to the indictment.

The demurrer set forth that the indictment was invalid because not sufficient facts were cited to constitute a crime; because more charges than one were included in the true bill; that the indictment was based on a bill of sale and hence invalid according to Oregon laws; that the indictment set forth that the alleged crime was committed through an agent, Frank White, and that the indictment did not set forth whether or not White acted with or without Hamilton's assent.

Hamilton was to have pleaded to the charge before Judge A. L. Leavitt this afternoon. But the pleading was postponed pending disposition of the demurrer. Hamilton is represented by Frank L. Mars.
