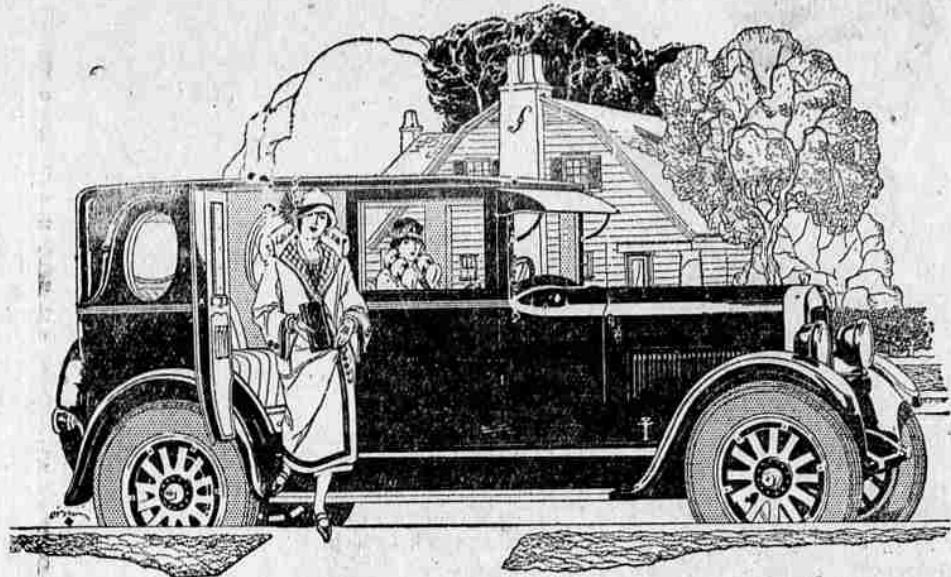

ORDINANCE HITS LORENZ CO. HARD

A long standing source of complaint from the fire department and business men, will be alleviated if an ordinance passed to its second reading by the council last night, has any effect. The ordinance will require the construction of adequate spark arresters, on all engines, fuel burners, and the like—unless burning oil.

All of which inspired a wordy protest from Otto Lorenz, of the Lorenz Plumbing company, who declared that a fine screen spark arrester, would choke up smoke stacks and impede generating of steam at the city heating plant.

A. W. Bardell's complaint against Chief of Police Harry M. Loucks did not even bring a word from the council. Bardell, who resigned last week from the police force said that he had been humiliated and subjected to unjust demands about the city hall during the past few months.

Signs of unprecedented spring building activity were evident last night when the city council granted 34 permits to build structures in Klamath Falls, an average of nearly five houses a day for the past week. As usual, however, the average type of house was not a substantial structure. The average cost of each house was under \$1000 apiece.

Although not approving the principle, the council agreed to finance the work of hauling away all trash which is placed before homes during Clean-up Week which started yesterday.
