Exclusive Grant To Strahorn Is Scored By Trout

No brief for Robert E. Strahorn nor his railroad, the O. C. & E., is held by Dr. F. M. Trout, president of the Malin Commercial club, who spoke before the Kiwanis club yesterday.

Nor did the Malin physician speak very brightly on continued S. P. control of Klamath tennage.

What he did favor was a union terminal system, free right to the Hill lines to build to Klamath Falls and last but not least, the construction of the Modoc Northern railroad.

Dr. Trout, speaking as a citizen of Klamath, but not of Klamath Falls, advised this city against granting any exclusive street crossing privileges to the O. C. & E., the S. P. or any other line that builds into Klamath Falls.

In his reference to the construction of the Modoc Northern railroad, Dr. Trout reminded the Kiwanis club that eastern shipments must be routed 50 miles over two mountains twice, whereas with the construction of the Modoc Northern railroad the route would be shortened 250 miles and the heavy pull over the mountains eliminated.
