ROAD PROGRAM MADE PUBLIC

project is being carried on by a dredger operation two shifts. This road will be completed through a swamp to a connection with the station of Midland. At that point it will connect with the Midland road. Owing to the type of land through which the road is projected, the road bed must settle one year before surfacing operations would be successful. Significance of this road, lies in the closer connection between Klamath Falls and Weed that will result when it is completed.

While the completion of the Rock Creek road and bridge, is a unit of the county road construction program for 1925, still the county court and county engineer's office can do nothing until the property holders along Conger avenue signify whether or not they desire the necessary improvement of Conger avenue, Mr. Stebbins observed. Nothing specific in this connection has been heard from the property holders of this section at this time.

First unit of the proposed Chiloquin-Sprague river road, following up the Sprague river water shed to the settlement of Sprague, will be surveyed and probably constructed. The first unit of construction is from Chiloquin over Power hill to a point near Bray's Mill along the bank of Sprague river. Whether or not this work will be started this year depends on whether or not the department of the interior can raise funds.

Under the agreement, as it now stands, the road will be financed by the department of the interior and the surveying done by the county. When preliminary negotiations were made, the county court frankly told Fred A. Baker, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, that no funds were available for the road project, as far as the county was concerned.

Construction of the Spring Lake market road will complete a unit of Market road construction that will be of great benefit to agricultural communities south of Klamath Falls, in that it connects the Dalles-California highway with the Midland market road. The project would commence at a point two and a half miles east of Midland and then would run south and then east to a connection with the Dalles-California highway between Merrill and Klamath Falls.

Preliminary survey work on this project will be completed this season. Actual construction will follow just as soon as market road funds are available.

At this time, funds for road construction are slightly scarce owing to slowness of citizens to pay their taxes.

DOKKIES WILL HOLD CELEBRATION HERE

Dokkies from Southern Oregon and Northern California will be in Klamath Falls on June 20, at which time a monster ceremonial will be staged here to arouse interest in the national convention to be held at Providence, R. I. this fall. The Dokkie band from Medford will be in full uniform, while other towns will send representatives to the big meeting.

MILLWORKERS ARE TO FORM A UNION

At a meeting last night of about thirty men from the Klamath Falls sawmills plans were laid for a membership drive for the local millworkers' union that is being formed here by C. D. Long, field representative for the National Federation of Labor.

The first action of the union will be to take up with the operators the question of raising the wages of the women employed in the box factories to the same level as the men. The meeting was held in Union hall, at the corner of Fifth and Main streets.

FINAL WORK ON GERBER DAM IS BEING FINISHED
Finishing touches on the huge government dam, 25 miles east of Bonanza, are now under way by a W. D. Miller construction crew, it was announced today by Herbert D. Newell, project manager of the irrigation district.
The dam, known as the Gerber dam, will be completed in every respect within four weeks, it was estimated. The main structure is finished, but a number of odd jobs, such as construction of rails along the top of the dam, must be done.
Approximately 15,000 acre feet of water was stored in the Gerber reservoir, the reclamation engineer said. This was by no means the capacity storage. Between 11,000 and 12,000 acre feet of water was allowed to run off during the spring, making a total potential storage capacity for 1925 of 27,000 acre feet.

MEXICAN EXECUTED
SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, May 15.—Pedro Cano, Mexican, was executed by a firing squad at the Utah state prison at sunrise this morning for the murder of June St. Clair at Park City, Utah, March 15, 1923. He was shot at 6:12 a. m. and pronounced dead three minutes and 48 seconds later.

Modoc Pine Mill Will Be Rebuilt In Near Future
Announcement was made last night that the L. B. Menefee Lumber company interests would during the summer start construction on a new mill on the site of the old Modoc Pine Co. plant that was destroyed by fire 12 days ago.
Varnel D. C. Beach, who made the announcement, declined to make any statement concerning how large the mill would be. Definite plans have not been consummated, he said, and only the fact that the mill will be rebuilt in the near future.

FAIRVIEW CLASS ROOM FUMIGATED
Protection of school children against possible infection led to the dismissal yesterday of the Eighth grade of Fairview school by County Health Officer Dr. G. S. Newsum. One pupil of the class room was reported to be suffering from scarlet fever. In accordance with the regulations of the department, the class was dismissed and last night the room was thoroughly fumigated.
A very light epidemic of chicken pox was reported to be prevailing in Klamath Falls at this time. None of these cases are of a serious nature, Dr. Newsum said.
