To break the big news all at once, the man will wear clothing built with geometrical precision designed to add, by optical illusion, at least an inch to his height.

There will be double-breasted suits with buttons so placed that the American man will appear to have a broad chest he hasn't got, and a slim waist he'd like to have, and a height that approaches those eight-foot male American beauties one sees lounging through the color advertisements and patting Russian wolf hounds in the nationally advertised clothing announcements. And, oh, the ravishing colors that monsieur will wear next fall. The inspiration for the colors came from expert study of the subtle tones of the pheasant, the egg-plant, the best root, the modest grouse and the ancient and brilliant hued incas of Peru.
