SCHOOL EXHIBIT Will Be Given

With the close of the spring term in the city schools of Klamath Falls, heads of the art departments have planned an exhibit of all work done from the upper grade school on Friday afternoon and evening in the Central school.

The exhibition has been planned by Miss Olive Wilson, head of the domestic art department, and by Russell Kidder, head of the manual training department. The exhibit will be held in the lower hall of the school, the hours from 1 p. m. to 5 p. m. and from 7 p. m. to 9 p. m. All patrons and patronesses and members of the Parent-Teachers' association are urged especially to attend.

For the first three prizes in the four divisions, ribbons will be awarded by two judges, whose names have not yet been announced. The four divisions in the domestic art department consist of wash dresses of gingham and other materials; lingerie; towels and hand-made work; miscellaneous articles. Manual art departments also fall under four classes: Tables, taborettes, stools; magazine racks and chests; lamp stands and boxes.

The exhibit will constitute the work in the domestic art group of the sixth and eighth grade girls; manual art work of the sixth, seventh and eighth grade boys. All students are from the Central, Pelican Bay, Mills Addition, Fairview and Riverside schools in Klamath Falls.

McCampbell To Be Tried Late Today For Second Time

His partner freed on the same charge in connection with the same incident, Wm. McCampbell of Ashland; will this afternoon, stand trial before a justice court jury on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor. Five of the six jurors for the cases were selected Saturday. They are W. J. Bertram, Luke Walker, Ed. Bodge, Glenn H. Jester and W. Montelius. H. Hackney, a sixth juror chosen, is out of town. It was learned this morning.

McCampbell and Todd were arrested on April 22 by State Probation Officer Fred Snyder and State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon. The two men stood trial jointly. The same evidence by both state and defense was used for and against each man at the trial. Todd was acquitted and the jury failed to come to an agreement on McCampbell.

SETTLEMENT NEAR PARIS, May 18.—The Temps said today it understands a definite proposal will be made within 10 days by the French government to the United States and Great Britain for the settlement of war debts.

COMMUNITY CLUBS STRONGLY OPPOSE S. P. COMMON USER

If the Klamath Community club's board could have its way, no common user over the Southern Pacific lines from Odell south to Klamath Falls would be granted the Hill lines. It developed Saturday afternoon at a board meeting.

Members of the board were in favor of the Hill lines building their own ribbon of steel all the way to Klamath Falls, and in answer to the argument that shippers would pay for increased cost of construction, they stated that the Interstate commerce commission would not allow any material increase in freight rates.

They also pointed out that Klamath county would be benefited by increase of taxes, if the line would be built all the way to Klamath Falls.

Rumors that opposition to the entrance of the Hill lines into Klamath county prevailed among certain civic organization of the county but were dissolved when the board went on record unanimously endorsing the entrance of the Hill lines into Klamath county.

Lynn P. Sabin, secretary of the chamber of commerce, took this occasion to say that the chamber resented statements made that the chamber was against the Hill lines. He told of the cooperation of the chamber with Hill line officials, when they were here to secure data.

The resolution favoring the Hill line construction was forwarded to W. F. Turner, president of the Oregon-Troun line.
