

## Federal Charge To Be Pressed Against 2 Men

With the jury sitting in the box, witnesses from Medford present in the court room and the defendant William McCampbell ready to go on trial on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor, the acting district attorney appeared in court yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock and moved to dismiss the state charge against McCampbell. The magistrate granted the motion and case terminated.

It developed that McCampbell, and his partner W. M. Todd, who was acquitted on a possession charge several weeks ago, are now charged with possession and transportation of intoxicating liquor by the federal authorities. The two men appeared before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas yesterday afternoon and their joint hearing was set for next Monday. Todd was released under \$1000 bond and McCampbell under \$750 bond.
