April Building Shows Increase Over Last Year

Although standing only fifth in the entire state, Klamath Falls building during the month of April 1925 increased nearly 100 per cent over building activities of April 1924, the monthly building survey of S. W. Straus & company discloses.

During the month, Klamath Falls building aggregated a total investment of \$99,815, while during the same month of 1924, the total building represented an expenditure of \$50,325.

However, building in Klamath Falls during April does show a decided decrease compared with the preceding month. March building permits aggregated an expenditure of \$117,375.

With the assurance of the permit

for the Central school being allowed this month, Klamath Falls will stand second or third in the state for building during the month of May. This one permit, representing an investment of \$125,000, will exceed total permits of April by over \$25,000.

Under his direction, the city streets have been kept clean and main arteries of traffic tapping various residence and industrial sections of the town were scraped and leveled facilitating auto traffic throughout the city.

Mr. Francy, who has had large experience in engineering work, resigned from his post to accept a better position with the Concrete Pipe company of this city.

MRS. LEVINSON DIES

PORTLAND, Ore., May 20.—Mrs. N. J. Levinson, 63, wife of N. J. Levinson, well-known Portland newspaper man, died last night at the family residence, following a general breakdown. Mr. Levinson, who has been ill, was informed of her condition a short time ago and bore it philosophically. His recovery is expected unless unforeseen complications develop.

Property Deeded To City Help To E. Main Project

As a result of two small pieces of property in industrial addition deeded to the city by the Klamath Development company and school district No. 1, two reverse curves on the proposed East Main street improvement will be eliminated, it was announced today.

One piece of property, deeded free of charge by the K. D. company, is located at a point where Michigan avenue joins Main street. The second tract is school property of the Mills Addition school on East Main street.

Booze Ships Flock To Halifax Harbor

NEW YORK, May 20.—Rum ships, driven from off American shores by the coast guard blockade are jamming Halifax harbor as one result of the determination of the administration from President Coolidge down, to enforce prohibition to the limit.

Thirteen ships and schooners are tied up at Halifax. Five arrived yesterday. They don't know where to turn. Some of them intend discharging their cargoes and returning to legitimate freight traffic.
