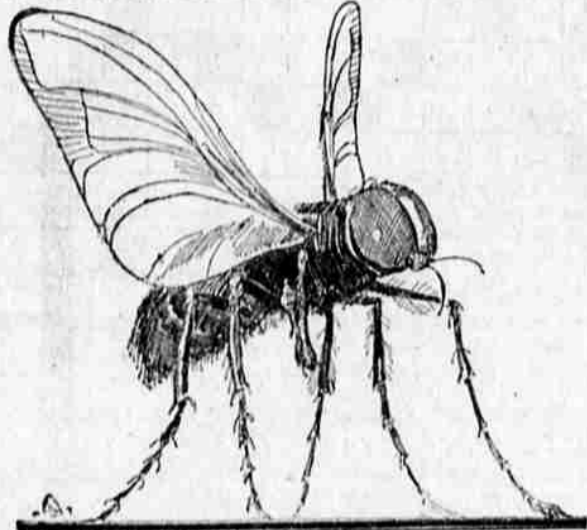

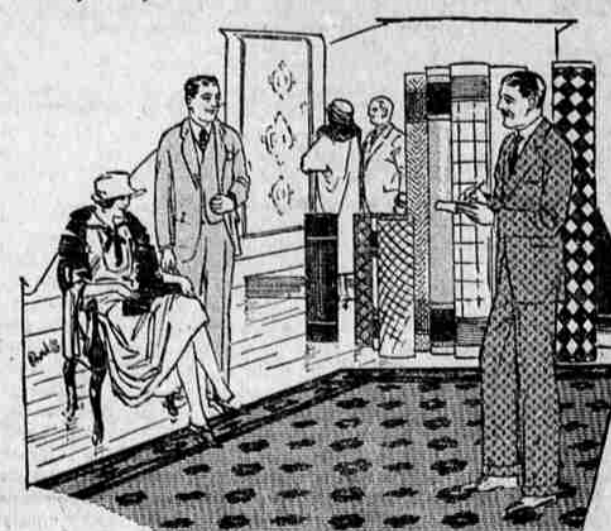
TO ENTER TRAINING
