4L Directors Start 13th Semi-Annual Meet In Portland

Portland—Fifteen loggers on the west coast underwent further curtailment last week when several large camps were entirely closed and fallers and buckers laid off at various, according to reports from various 4L employment service offices received at 4L headquarters here today.

Logging and sawmilling in the pine districts of Eastern Washington, Oregon and in Idaho, are at seasonal height, the reports show, and practically all lumber operations there are busy.

PORTLAND—There is no sign of a let-up in logging activity along the Columbia river. Practically all camps in this district are operating with full crews.

ABERDEEN—Falling and bucking operations have been stopped at several more camps in Grays Harbor district. There has been no change in operating time of local sawmills.

Grays Harbor in each of work elsewhere and there are very few men out of work either in Hoquiam or Aberdeen.

TACOMA — Labor turnover in camps and sawmills of this district last week showed a heavy increase. Nearly all of the local mills are continuing the five-day week.

SEATTLE — Looking on Puget Sound was further curtailed last week when the Clapus, Carlisborg, Cavano, and Puget Sound Mills & Timber companies' camps were closed down.

SKOKANE—Railroad section and grading work in this district last week required more additional help than did any industry.
