of the entire county, every organization and official to actively go to work at once to bring before the Interstate Commerce Commission the fact that the Hill lines are wanted and that they are unalterably opposed to the program as outlined by the Southern Pacific. Otherwise it will be accepted that Klamath county is satisfied with what it has.

It must not be forgotten that when the fight was on between the Southern Pacific and the Union Pacific for control of the Central Pacific, the hope of the Modoc-North was held out to this county and a quasi promise made that this city would get the division and shops. Just as soon as the fight for the Central Pacific was won, the Southern Pacific let a contract for the line from Grass Lake to Dietz and completed its plans for placing the division and shops at Fuego, about fifty miles north of here.

Chiloquin Is Striving for High School

Growth of Community Will Bring About Expansion

One more high school will open its doors next fall if a movement on foot in Chiloquin for the creation of a high school district and establishment of a high school meets with success, it was learned today.

Possessed of only a primary school to serve the educational needs of the community, Chiloquin citizens have organized and plan to take every step possible toward the consummation of their objective, namely a high school.

Growth of Chiloquin, as the result of increased lumber production in that territory, has brought a greater demand for school facilities. Nearly a dozen high school students of Chiloquin are forced to either drive each day to Fort Klamath high or the greater distance to Klamath Falls.

During the past few months, establishment of a high school, has been a topic of general conversation on the streets of Chiloquin, and the matter has been brought to the attention of County School Superintendent.

Under the county unit system, Chiloquin would have to create a high school district and raise funds from this district to finance the high school.

However they would be assured of a comfortable sum from the county high school funds. The law stipulates that the cost per pupil in the school for each day would be taken out of the county high school fund.

The county school superintendent, would act only in an advisory capacity in connection with the administration of proposed Chiloquin district high school.

New Sawmill Will Rise At Lakeview Within Few Days

The Lakeview Mills and Timber company has purchased the Parker and Hamaker sawmill, located four miles from the end of the Swan Lake spur, and will move the mill to Lake county immediately to cut the company's holdings of 20,000,000 feet of pine adjacent to the mill site five miles south of Lakeview. The capacity of the sawmill will be increased to between fifty and sixty thousand feet, making it the largest sawmill in Lake county.

The Lakeview Mills and Timber company has been recently incorporated for \$30,000. The stockholders and officers of the company are M. Peterson, president; C. A. Doty, vice president, and Charles H. Wilson, secretary. Wilson was with the Weyerhaeuser people for several years before entering the new corporation.

The stockholders in the Parker and Hamaker mill were Earl Hamaker, J. J. Parker and G. O. Parker. The mill has been idle for the past two seasons.

Strahorn Sell-Out No Surprise, Says Hill Line Counsel

Hill line officials, as well as the people of Klamath Falls, felt certain all along that the Southern Pacific dominated the Oregon, California and Eastern railroad, and the announcement this week by President William Sproule of the Southern Pacific that his line will give the Strahorn line the needed financial backing, was not important from a railroad standpoint.

So declared Judge Charles H. Carey of Portland, chief counsel for the Hill lines, who arrived here last night on business connected with the railroad problems in this section of the state.

"The announcement is not as important as it seems," he said. "For some time past it has been generally believed that the Southern Pacific was in control of the Strahorn lines, and that the granting of the request of Mr. Strahorn for terminal privileges in Klamath Falls would result in duplicating the extensive terminal facilities already controlled by the Southern Pacific in the city. It may not be so generally understood but it is a fact that the pending applications of both the Strahorn and the Hill lines before the Interstate Commerce commission for permission to build trackage to Klamath Falls would soon make it necessary for both the Strahorn and the Southern Pacific companies to answer the specific interrogations propounded by the commission and to state under oath the exact relations and understandings between the latter companies. They would have to do this within a few weeks at most, and the public would have the facts anyway. So this announcement is simply anticipating and meeting the inevitable.

"It simplifies the situation very much to have it clearly understood at the outset that the Strahorn and Southern lines constitute but one system and not two and that the Strahorn application for extensions northward from Sprague River are really in the interest of the Southern Pacific. So understood, the question resolves itself into a determination whether the vast resources of the Klamath district are to have an outlet to the great markets through one railway system, or two. We believe there is enough business for two.

"We feel that with the advent of the northern lines the milling and marketing of the timber of the district will be expanded and the agricultural interests of the section will be given new encouragement. Our success in getting forward with our project will depend in no small degree upon the support given by the people of Klamath Falls and the adjacent territory. We are much gratified by the cordial expressions of the press and the people and we are hastening our surveys to find feasible routes for our railroads as soon as possible.

"The recent announcement in the newspapers is simply an earlier statement of what will have to be divulged to the Interstate Commerce commission and it is important to the people of Klamath Falls to keep constantly in mind the fact that with ownership or control of the Oregon, California & Eastern railway in the Southern Pacific, as well informed people have for some time past believed to have been the case, the demands of the O. C. & E. for exclusive franchise for the

PORTLAND AND KLAMATH FALLS, OREGON

Will Explore Baffin Island

WASHINGTON, May 21.—The first comprehensive exploration of Baffin Island, the "land of many lands," which lies sprawled out for 1000 miles with points and promontories and great lakes north of Labrador and southwest of Greenland across from Lavis strait, is one of the aims of the MacMillan-Navy Arctic plane expedition this summer.

Discovered 349 years ago by Sir Martin Probscher, the English navigator, scarcely anything more is known of it than in that day, says a statement issued by the national geographic society, which is one of the sponsors of the expedition. A vast virgin field there awaits the expedition's camera.

"Baffin island," the statement stated, "is the third largest island in the world, Australia and Greenland surpassing it."

Baffin island has resisted thorough exploration by virtue of its vastness. It is larger than any state of the United States except Texas and would make almost four of New England.
