Bureau Mobilizes Against Peddlers

If business men who constitute the back bone of the community are to be protected, an ordinance must be passed by the city council in the near future requiring the licensing of all peddlers who come to Klamath Falls, it was brought out at a meeting of the Merchants' bureau last night in the chamber of commerce.

Opinion of local merchants present was that the number of peddlers in Klamath Falls at this time had never been exceeded in the past and that the time had arrived to do something about it. So merchants will ask the council to pass the ordinance and will also ask the police department for its cooperation in the enforcing of the ordinance.

With the single exception of the Klamath manufacturing company, all lumber companies have failed to cooperate with merchant in the collecting of bills, it was said.
