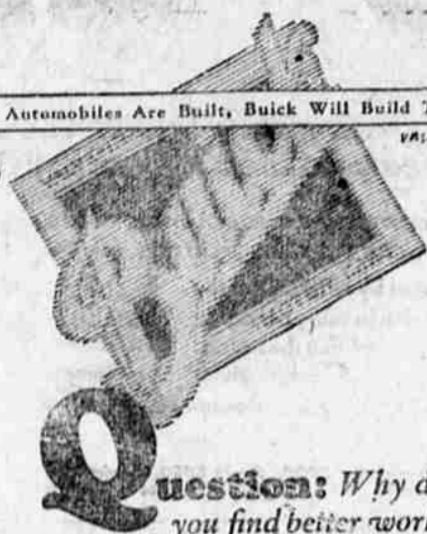

Annual Report of Chamber to Be Presented

H. D. Mortenson to Be Chairman—Campbell Will Speak

A phase, interesting in every detail will be the annual report of the chamber of commerce when the fifth annual community dinner will be given in the White Pelican hotel, Friday night, May 29. Covers for 250 guests will be laid and it is expected that many more than this number will be seeking reservations to hear Ex-Governor Thomas Campbell of Arizona who will be the speaker of the evening.

Through long distance communication this morning, it was learned by the chamber of commerce office that H. D. Mortenson, president of the chamber last year, who is in San Francisco at the present, will be in Klamath Falls for the community dinner and serve as chairman for the evening.

Ex-Governor Campbell, who is in Klamath county in the interests of the board of Survey and Adjustment in company with Francis M. Goodwin, former assistant secretary of the Interior and W. A. Delzell, secretary to Governor Walter M. Pierce, will base his discussion before the guests of the dinner on the Klamath country and the results of his visit here in the interests of the board. The chamber feels exceedingly fortunate in having Campbell with them at the dinner, according to Lynn Sabin, secretary.

Providing music during the evening will be the Little Symphony orchestra of Klamath Falls, under the direction of Harry Borel. The dinner will far exceed those of the past five years, in both interest and appeal to the community at large.

McCampbell and Todd Are Held

W. H. Todd, freed once in the state court on a charge of possession of intoxicating liquor, was bound over on the same charge and in connection with the same alleged misdemeanor, to the federal grand jury by Bert C. Thomas, United States commissioner, this morning.

William McCampbell, upon whose fate on the same charge the jury could not agree, was also bound over to the federal grand jury in Portland.

McCampbell was released under \$750 surety bond and Todd was freed under a \$1000 bond. The federal grand jury meets in Portland next month and it is anticipated that the charges against the two men will be investigated at that session.

At the hearing this morning it was found that there was not sufficient evidence to bind over the two men to the federal grand jury on a charge of transportation of intoxicating liquor, so the possession charge was preferred.

Former Offender Gets Heavy Fine

Harry O'Neill, whose laxness at obeying traffic regulations has been brought before authorities on other occasions, drew a \$100 fine yesterday afternoon in Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker's court, for speeding Saturday night on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway between this city and Keno.

D. W. Berglund and H. A. Tolle were each fined \$10 and costs for speeding 45 miles an hour on the long straight of way on The Dalles-California highway, just before the Williamson river bridge. Van Ravenscroft was fined \$15 and costs for speeding in the same section. He will appear later to answer to a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated.
