### DROUGHT HURTS THISTLES

Canada thistles and other peren-  
nial weed pests are more easily con-  
trolled during the dry weather now  
present in Oregon. Cutting off the  
plant and burning those which are  
about to bloom will greatly weaken  
them, find the experiment station.  
Plowing and spring toothing the  
ground will kill many of the roots.  
Continued clean cultivation during  
the summer and sowing a heavy  
smother crop of grain and vetch  
early in the fall will do much to-  
ward eliminating the perennial  
weeds.

## Crops Damaged by Cold Snap

NEW YORK, May 26.—(A.P.)  
Records for May cold weather have  
been shattered and much damage  
has been done to crops throughout  
the east and middle west in the  
most prolonged severe late spring  
freezes in history. It may be sev-  
eral days before temperatures re-  
turn to normal, the weather bureau  
says, adding to damage caused by  
rain, hail and snow after the heat  
wave Saturday. Frosts the last two  
nights have cut the value of grain,  
fruit and vegetable crops by mil-  
lions of dollars. In Canada alone  
reports are made of more than  
\$2,000,000 damage.

## Chamber Favors New Location Of Rock Creek Span

Confronted with objections from  
three property holders along Conger  
avenue, a committee of the cham-  
ber of commerce today reported to  
the board of directors that no head-  
way could be gained on the com-  
pletion of the Rock bridge and road  
project unless the California  
Oregon Power company forced the  
issue by creating an improvement  
district itself.

Against the improvement of Conger  
avenue it appeared that several  
of the old time residents along the  
street while favoring the improve-  
ment declined to spend the neces-  
sary money.

"What we want is the comple-  
tion of the project," was the ob-  
servation of Andy Collier, president  
of the chamber. "There has been a  
large investment that cannot be cap-  
italized until the bridge is built."

E. B. Hall, chairman of the roads  
and highways committee was in-  
structed to again approach property  
holders on the proposition of cre-  
ating an improvement district for  
the improvement of Conger avenue  
and if that failed then to ask the  
power company to take the initia-  
tive and create the improvement dis-  
trict itself. Then if both these pro-  
positions failed, to find out whether  
or not the bond issue which finan-  
ced the Rock Creek bridge was so  
worded as to necessitate construc-  
tion of the bridge below the Link  
river dam.

MOSCOW, May 26.—Foreign min-  
isters and ambassadors stationed  
here today saw the Russian Crown  
Jewels.

In order to remove the belief  
abroad that the crown jewels had  
disappeared or been reduced in num-  
ber the Soviet government invited  
all foreign diplomats to visit the  
state vault where these treasures  
are stored.

000,000.

## YEAR-ROUND FRESHENING BEST IN MOST DAIRIES

Most dairymen believe that fall  
or winter freshening is preferable to  
spring or summer freshening be-  
cause of the distribution of labor  
throughout the year, and the great-  
er production per cow. This gen-  
eral opinion was obtained by taking  
the average of 64 cow testing ac-  
countations for a ten-year period, 1910-

1920, and is reported in U. S. D. A.  
Farmer's Bulletin No. 1071.

Fall freshened cows cost more to  
keep but produced enough more  
butter fat above that of cows in  
other seasons to compensate for the  
higher feed cost. Production of  
winter freshening cows was very  
close to that of fall freshening.  
Spring and summer freshening pro-  
duces in the order given. Labor  
costs were not included in the sur-  
vey but if they had been the figures  
would be more in favor of the fall  
and winter freshening, due to the  
scarcity of labor in the summer.
