Klamath Rates High in Issue of Publication

Oregon Business Gives Space in Magazine to County

Klamath Falls rates are high this month in the May issue of Oregon Business, official publication of the Oregon State chamber of commerce. A portion of the editorial section was devoted to the railroad question in Klamath Falls and Klamath county and other references to this section of southern Oregon were made frequently throughout the issue.

May, the month when the tourist season is beginning to be noticeably heavy, brought out tourist travel, and it was to this subject that the issue was mainly devoted. A guide and plat to tourist camp grounds in Oregon was prepared, listing 106 different camp grounds, both public and private, of the cities of Oregon.

Of all of these, one of the best equipped guides was that of the Klamath Falls camp which provided everything to the tired, comfort-seeking traveler from drinking water, cool and fresh, to shade trees, lights and telephones and free fuel.

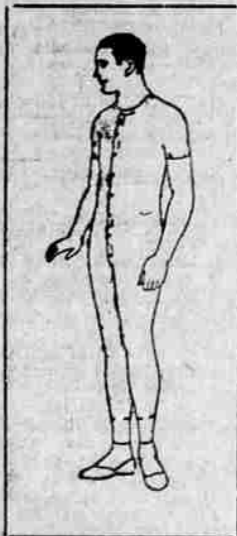
