

LAKE BOOZE RUNNER IN LAW'S TOILS

U. S. Liquor Men Make Capture; Armed Girl Is Part of Crew

ROCHESTER, N. Y. May 28.—Ben Kerr, of Toronto, alleged 'king' of the Lake Ontario rum runners, was arrested today as he was unloading a cargo of Canadian ale from the motorboat Matmas on the lake shore near Sea Breeze. Arrested with Kerr were four men and an armed girl, Mae Davis, of Webster. The seizure was made by Andrew J. Wiedahmann, collector of the port, customs inspector and a coast guard cutter, after Kerr had attempted to escape.

Eight shots were fired at the rum craft and brought it to a halt. The men were held on charges of smuggling. The girl was charged with carrying concealed weapons.

When the inspectors approached the little inlet where the cargo was being unloaded, the Davis girl, dressed in overalls, with a slouch hat, blocked their path. An officer, thinking she was a man, ordered her to surrender, but when her right hand moved in her overalls pocket the officer grabbed it and pulled out a loaded automatic revolver.

The motorboat was capable of carrying about 1200 cases of ale. "You have smashed the lake rum king," Kerr told collector Wiedahmann. "The rest of the runners are too yellow to come over here very often."

RIFFS GET MORE ARMY RECRUITS

PARIS, May 28, (AP)—Abd-El-Krim, the Riffian leader is actively recruiting supporters among the tribesmen inhabiting the zone north of the Ouergha river, which has just been abandoned by the French.

Hard fighting is continuing with neither side making an appreciable gain.

Information from sources which the French consider unimpeachable is to the effect that 147 young Germans, trained in various semi-military athletic organizations, have left Germany for Morocco by way of Spain to join Abd-El-Krim's troops.

Some, it is said, will receive commissions, while the others will serve as non-commissioned officers.

Reclamation To Be Subject For Annual Dinner

Ex-governor Thomas Campbell, of Arizona, who will be the speaker at the fifth annual community dinner of the chamber of commerce at the White Pelican hotel, on Friday night, has chosen as his subject for the evening, "Reclamation", because, say Campbell, there are many definitions given for "Reclamation" giving a whole field to talk on.

Mr. Campbell, who is in Klamath county in the interests of the Board of Survey and Adjustment for the Klamath irrigationists, was born and raised in a town, much similar to Klamath Falls, Prescott, Arizona. "Here in Klamath Falls you have a fine community in the making," said Ex-Governor Campbell today, shortly after the preliminary hearing in the circuit court room, when the irrigation problems were being aired.

"These things must come up," he said, speaking of the diversified opinion and problems that have arisen. "This always happens when a community is interested in more than one thing. If Klamath Falls were purely agricultural, purely lumber or timber, purely manufacturing, these problems would not arise. It is perhaps much better that they do, you are a great city in the making."

"I shall use as my topic for the dinner Friday night, 'Reclamation' because it has many different definitions and it gives me more field in which to discuss the problems of Klamath."

The subject of the Federated board will probably be stressed by Mr. Campbell during the dinner hour as well.

A gigantic mushroom, one of the largest ever seen in the Klamath country, was found yesterday afternoon on the east side of Tule lake by Ralph Yordy, Tule lake homesteader. Joe Zumpfe, another homesteader on the lake, brought the remarkable specimen to Klamath Falls this morning, for official inspection. The mushroom weighed six pounds. The circumference of the specimen was 48 inches and the diameter 10 inches. It stood eight inches high. The stalk was ten inches in circumference and the diameter 3 inches.
