Rail Body Would Reopen Central Pacific Hearing

SALEM, Ore., May 28. — Petition to reopen the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific railroad company case insofar as it affects the railroad map of Oregon, also a request that should the application of the Great Northern and Northern Pacific for permit to extend to Klamath Falls be granted the public service commission may order a joint and common user or joint construction and common use of the present uncompleted line, has been made of the interstate commerce commission.

"We have asked a further hearing on the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific case at the same time hearing is held on the application of the Hill lines," Corey said.

"The commission deems it would be derelict in its duty to the public if it permitted a repetition of the fiasco of 1911-12, when two lines of railroad were permitted to duplicate construction up the Deschutes river to Bend at which time approximately \$24,000,000 was spent when one-half that amount would have been sufficient.

"This burden of unnecessary investment will eventually be reflected in the freight rates paid by the general public."
