No Harmony

The board of directors in office during the spring of 1923, was not in sympathy with the wishes of the majority of the water users, it was claimed. This was shown by their attitude towards an initiative petition circulated among water users by R. E. Bradbury prior to the sale, making that a regular election be held in the district, the issue being whether or not the district would submit a bid for the Keno and Ankeny canals. Approximately 125 water users had signed, it was said. The first time the petitions were submitted the board refused to consider them on the ground of a technicality. The second time, they refused on the ground that the board could not consider an initiative petition under the Oregon initiative and referendum act.

Bradbury Hampered

All petitions for delay in the sale of the canal met with no success. R. E. Bradbury, chairman of the present district board testified. Purpose for the delay was to have time enough to submit the proposition of the district buying the canals from the government, to the voters. To the petition for delay the government would reply that they held the right to reject any and all bids and that the interests of the district would be safeguarded through that medium. It was indicated that the sale would be investigated by a commission from the department of the interior before the sale confirmed, it was brought out. Through official announcement, protestants to the sale were informed that a commission composed of A. P. Davis, D. W. Davis and Miles Cannon would arrive on June 5, 1925. Prior to their arrival formal protests to the sale had been filed by R. E. Bradbury and C. W. Eberlein.

Instead of arriving on scheduled time, the commission arrived in Klamath Falls on June 3 and, Mr. Eberlein testified this morning, remained under cover during their brief stay. No attempt was made to get in touch with the protestants of the sale and give them a hearing. Mr. Eberlein and Mr. Bradbury testified. The local newspaper did not know of their presence here, nor did the public in general know that the commission had been in Klamath county before the date of June 5 for the purpose of investigating the contract, Mr. Eberlein said.

Only an Associated Press dispatch from Yreka, California, gave the public any knowledge of the visit of the commission here. In that dispatch it was stated that the commission had spent several days in Klamath Falls and, they had been escorted to Copco on the Klamath river by officials of the California Oregon Power company, Mr. Eberlein said. The article quoted one of the members of the commission as stating he was fully satisfied with the contract and would recommend its adoption by the government, the witness testified.

Mr. Eberlein said that indications pointed to the board remaining under cover during their presence in Klamath Falls. The district went on record as opposing the personnel of the local appraisal board which was chosen for the purpose of ascertaining the value of Keno and Ankeny canals. The stipulation of the sale was to the effect that the canals would not be sold for an amount less than the appraised value.

The three members of the appraisal board were J. A. Gordon, R. E. Smith and a reclamation official. Pointing out that they had no desire to cast any reflection on the integrity of Mr. Gordon in the performance of his duties, the district still claimed—in its testimony this morning—that Mr. Gordon was not eligible for an appraiser because he was the owner of stock in the California Oregon Power company.

At this point, Chairman Campbell remarked that he knew personally that Mr. Gordon was the owner of 17 shares of stock of the California Oregon Power company at the time he acted as appraiser of the canals for the government. The district also set forth that the reclamation official could not act as a disinterested judge.

"That appraisal board should have been composed of absolutely disinterested parties", Mr. Carnahan claimed. "If the case was tried in the courts, no owners of shares in the California Oregon Power company would be allowed to sit on the jury, would they?" An element of humor was injected into the hearing when Mrs. H. R. Reynolds of Portland, owner of property in the Klamath Irrigation district, told the board that she was of the opinion that most of the politicians handling public money were inclined to be crooked.

"I want it made clear that I mean men," she said. "We women haven't had a chance yet." "If I thought," Governor Campbell replied, "that all government officials were such as you claim, I would move out of the country." Mrs. Reynolds testified that she had not been informed of the true facts concerning the sale of the canals and hence she voted against the district bidding for the canals. She said that the straw ballot swayed her in her decision.
