Heavyweights End Training for Tuesday Night Card—To Be Fast Affair, Is Opinion

Both Jim (Firpo) Gorman and Sammy Olsen, 190-pounders who tangle Tuesday night at Scandinavian hall, will end intensive training with heavy workouts Sunday, both boxers announced this morning.

Gorman continues to be the betting favorite of local loggers, with plenty of Olson backers ready to take the money. Johnny Carlson is favored over Coffman despite the clever showing made by the flashy Portlander in his fight here with Crim on the last card.

Carlson's greater experience and known speed are figured to give him the edge over the hard-hitting Coffman. Victory for Coffman in the forthcoming scrap would be a big boost upward in the game for him, and he is training harder for this match than any previous one in years.

Portland advices indicate that Coffman has the ability to weather punishment and his friends figure that his gameness will pull him out of any hole into which he may be led by the more experienced Carlson.

Think Burns Will Reveal Robber In Radium Robbery

NEW YORK, May 30. (A. P.)—Hospitals were on the lookout today for the men seeking treatment for burns because of the theft of \$20,000 worth of radium in a holdup.

John Gilliano, a city employe, was carrying the radium in a lead box wrapped in brown paper out of the home of Dr. Isaac Levin when he was felled by a blow on the head. His assailant grabbed the package and made off with two companions in a waiting taxi.

The police expressed confidence that the radium would prove the undoing of the thieves, because of its power of the rays, which have fatally burned many scientists experimenting with it.

no power to put witnesses on the stand and have them testify under oath. There has been no investigation here like the department of justice would make. This thing never has been investigated. We have not the power to do it.

Like Land Frauds
"This is like the land fraud cases which started in 1905. Special agents were sent to investigate. All returned and reported nothing wrong. They heard nothing wrong; saw nothing wrong; felt nothing wrong. But when President Roosevelt sent his investigation committee they not only found something wrong but it affected practically every part of the state and sent all the land office officials to the penitentiary and even members of congress.

"That is why we are here. We have not the facilities or authority to investigate this. We have not the power to investigate. We have given a brief outline, and told you how great property that belonged in part to this district has been turned over to the California Oregon Power Co. by a course of procedure that we cannot get to the bottom of. We are giving you the outline to get started on. It should be investigated farther. We are doing all we can. Our property is lost to us. We got nothing for it."

Campbell Evasive
Campbell—If you make a statement to the board it is so that we can make a recommendation in black and white. I want your testimony in the form of records which were all available to us, but there is nothing here that would suggest what we should suggest or recommend to the secretary. We would have to approach it from what we found in these records that this property is now vested for 50 years and some in perpetuity and whatever facts might be added, and that there is sufficient evidence presented upon which we believe there is reasonable ground to pursue the development of fraud. We cannot do that; because that is not in here.

Carnahan—You do not think so?
Campbell—Where do you get the idea that you have shown that there was fraud perpetrated or testimony given to that effect? Or did you find out something somewhere else which you have not presented? I might say "No," but I have a feeling that somebody is crooked out there.

"It is true the matter was not presented to the voters by the officers of the district when the contract was executed, and I think it is worth while going on a fishing expedition, and so I recommend that you go fishing.

"That would be the position I would be placed in."
Carnahan—I know in civil suits to get aside a transaction, they might take an old woman or weak-minded man who had lost his property and have the conveyance set aside.
Campbell—They might try.

Carnahan Explains
Carnahan—They would succeed. The presumption of fraud practically exists when you present such a state of facts. You can't prove fraud by direct evidence. You have to infer it from a set of facts. That is the only way you can get it. Our set of facts is that we owned this power property and it is gone and we got nothing for it. That is one set of facts.

Campbell—A man might lose his property without it being fraudulent disposed of.
Carnahan—But when a course of conduct as shown by this record is continued over a long period of years, does it not show indications of fraud—constructive fraud?
Campbell—Course of whose conduct?

Carnahan—The Interior Department, the reclamation officials, the local outfit.

Campbell's Statement

"I have been interested to listen for your proof of fraud, because all the records presented have been available to us. As I stated in the first instance, in this particular case, I doubted very much whether that could be shown. The occasion of our coming here was to make recommendations. Unless we found fraud, or substantive fraud was proved, on what basis could we recommend that there be any further investigation? If fraud had been perpetrated, it should be investigated by the proper department.

"All that I have gotten, all that has come before the board by this splendid presentation is that these facts occurred, but up to this point we have had no suggestion of fraud in the entire negotiations covering seven years. Unless this proof may be introduced, speaking personally and as a member of the commission, I fail to see what we can recommend in the matter.

Carnahan Replies

Carnahan—Then you don't think that this manner in which the transactions have been negotiated, the way the votes were secured, and their manner of proceeding to turn the property over to the power company indicates any fraud?

Campbell—There may be a question of error, of loss of rights, and of mistakes. Of course I hold definite opinions, and always have a general proposition. I don't yet see any collusion or even a suggestion of fraud. It is true that the judge who passed upon the proceedings leading up to the formation of the irrigation district and the election at which this contract, in which the clause waiving the rights to power, water and canals was inserted by the board of directors, was passed, is now attorney for the California Oregon Power company, and that Koppen, who was statistician here and made certain allocations of cost over the project and was in the employ of the Service for a number of years, is now in the employ of the California Oregon Power Co.

Carnahan—This investigation is largely based on the public records. No Fraud
Campbell—Yes, they were available to us and we could have gotten all of them. I thought you would be able to prove or at least suggest where additional proof could be obtained upon which we could base our recommendations that fraud had been perpetrated upon the people here, or on the government, or the people of the project. I have not seen a scintilla of fraud presented.
Carnahan—Of course you have issued no subpoenas. And we have
