Everyone admires a success. Especially is this true when that success is an individual and the more so when that person is a past master in his particular line. That is our attitude towards ex-Governor Campbell, chairman of the Board of Survey and Adjustment that has just concluded its hearings here. We feel that when he returns to Washington he should be received with opened arms and with the salutation, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

We have been an interested attendant at the various conferences, hearings and the like that for the past twenty years have grown out of the Reclamation Service entrance to this county. To handle these the best the Service had was enlisted, but they were crude and clumsy when lined alongside this prince of polish, this chevalier of courtesy.

Marked with all the lineaments of a brilliant mind, the attributes of which shone out time and again throughout the hearing, he asks us to deny our senses and reason and believe that he is so obtuse as to fail in grasping the evidences of fraud that permeated the negotiations and acts leading up to the final consummation of the theft of the water power, power sites and canals from the Klamath Project.

We don't believe he is dishonest; we don't believe he is a crook; we don't believe he is a trickster. But we do believe that he believes that the claims of the farmers are well founded, but the traditions of the department must be maintained and his superiors protected. We are not surprised or disappointed. It is just what we expected, only we did not expect it to be delivered in the Chesterfieldian style in which it was so masterly handled by the Governor.

However, we have accomplished what we started out to do. In fact a little more so. To this we are also indebted to the Governor. We are glad he came, that Mr. Hubert Work exercised such shrewdness in his selection and we congratulate him in the successful manner in which he executed his task.

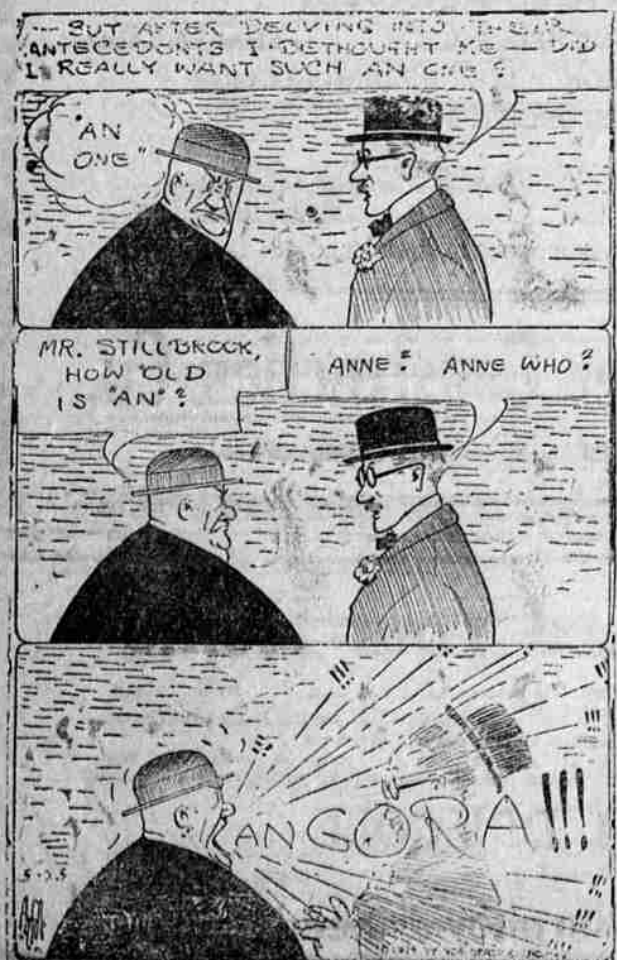
Colored Prince Loses Tooth In Restaurant Mix

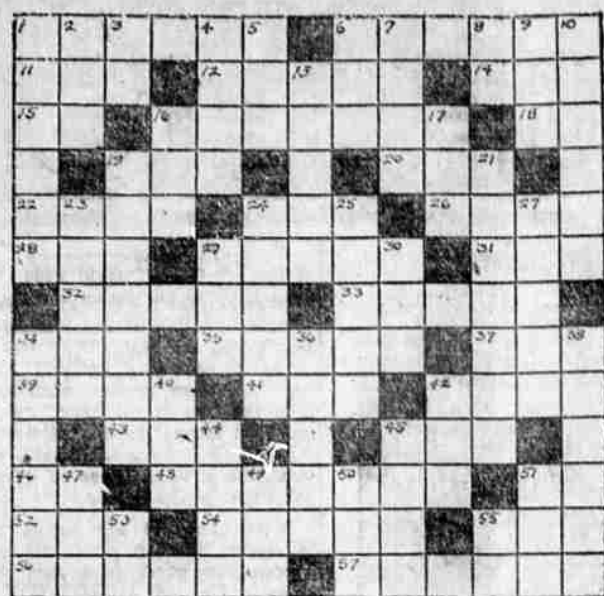

'NOTHING WRONG' EX-GOVE. THINKS

Two years after the project was taken over, the farmer with a business trend of mind, came into control and has been ever since. Since his advent, prosperity has marked the history of our project in Arizona. "What this chamber of commerce should do, what the city of Klamath Falls should do, is pay more attention to the problems of the Klamath project. Just kindly remember that your timber will soon be gone and that after that it will be the reclama-

tion project that will be behind the prosperity of Klamath county.

Gross Income Less
"As one of those members of the Fact Finding commission that recommended that no more lands of Tule lake be opened up again, I wish to state at this time that my opinions have not changed by reason of the hearing conducted here. I inspected the Tule lake lands. They are not a success and the opening of additional acreage in that territory would simply mean more sorrow to the settlers."

Ex-Governor Campbell pointed out the fact that the gross per acre crop production on the Klamath project was about \$20. was lower than practically all of the projects they had visited.

"You have water in abundance for the irrigation," he said. "You have land, far above the average fertility of other reclamation projects. What you have not is transportation and settlers."

Lack of Transportation
"The trouble with the Klamath project has been the inability of competing with Pacific Coast and National markets due to the transportation problems. What good would it do for a farmer to grow a large crop, if the cost of transporting it to the market were to keep him from competing outside?"

"Therefore, the lack of transportation has been one of the contributing causes to the small income of the Klamath project."

"Settlers, you need. You need in addition a type of settler that will bring diversified farming, for I can assure you that without diversified farming, the Klamath project will never be a success. Prosperity will never come as long as project farmers concentrate upon alfalfa and grain. Beets will be a success here I am sure, also lettuce."

The former Arizona Governor, frequently referred to his own project, the Salt River irrigation project, as a good example of what could be done through experimentation and diversified farming.

Groesbeck Talks
R. C. Groesbeck, vice-president of the chamber of commerce, delivered a brief address summing up the activities of the chamber of commerce for the year. He pointed out that the chamber of commerce was not an agency to indulge personalities, but a clearing house of constructive action. He asked that no credence be placed in the statements of complaints and critics of the chamber, who do not appear before the board of directors in person and let their protestations be known.

A. M. Collier, newly elected president of the chamber, said he wanted the support of the entire community and county in order to put over the most constructive annual program ever undertaken by the chamber of commerce.

Mortenson Presides
H. D. Mortenson, retiring president of the chamber of commerce presided at the banquet. During the course of his remarks, he took oc-

casian to plead for the support of the industries and corporations that were already established in Klamath county.

There is a tendency to forget that which Klamath county all ready has in the pursuit of other industries which may or may not come here, he said.
