### Board of Survey Leaves Klamath For South Today

Ex-Governor Thomas E. Campbell of Arizona and Francis M. Goodwin, former assistant secretary of the interior, departed this morning for California after a week's stay in Klamath Falls during which the Klamath reclamation projects were investigated.

"There is nothing further that I can say concerning the local situation," Mr. Campbell said, "beyond the fact that the visit here was greatly enjoyed. The board of survey and adjustment has not yet come to final conclusions concerning the situation here. We have come to certain tentative conclusions, however, but there must be further corroborations. I think the report will be submitted to the secretary of the interior in about 60 days.

M. H. Lapham also accompanied the party which left this morning. Mr. Lapham took several tests of soil on the Klamath project.

### Fosdick Welcomed By Rockefellerers

NEW YORK, June 1.—(A.P.)—Three generations of Rockefellerers have welcomed the Rev. Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick at the start of his "thrilling adventure," yesterday he made his debut in the pulpit of the Park Avenue Baptist church, which he intends transforming into a free church where all Christians may worship regardless of creed.

Dense lines of expectant worshippers two blocks long were turned away. Police were called upon to handle the crowds.

The sermon over, it was two hours before the edifice was cleared of people. John D. Rockefeller was the first to congratulate Dr. Fosdick for "the eloquent and moving sermon." John D. Rockefeller Jr. next clasped the preacher's hand. Then came his son, Winthrop.

John D. Rockefeller Jr., asked to comment, replied: "The situation speaks for itself."

The Rockefellerers were besieged by parishioners. The elder oil magnate presented new dimes to several children.

Dr. Fosdick in his sermon generalized on the conditions under which he accepted the pastorate. He had asked among other things that the church be made "inclusive" with baptism by immersion left optional.

He said he marvelled at the courage of the congregation in embarking with him on a "thrilling adventure."

Fans who like sluggers and fans who like boxers will have ample opportunity to see which style works out best in the ring when they witness the boxing card tomorrow night at Scandinavian hall.

In the headliner they will see shifty, speedy, 190-pound Sammy Olson tangle with Jim Pirpo Gorman, an earnest advocate of the school which says that the way to pin lies on an opponent is to rush him, get close to him and then in-fight him to a finish.

The question in the main bout and in all the others will be which boxer makes the first mistake.

Every man on the card is possessed of a wallop. All are experienced and all are fast. If no lucky punches occur, a fighting treat should result.

Following Olson and Gorman, who will step ten rounds, will come Joe Coffman and Johnny Carlson in a six-round bout which doesn't look any too rosy for either one of them.

The men are evenly matched, both as to weight and experience, though in the latter Carlson has the edge. Both are willing, both are speedy, and both carry wallops that hurt.

It seems doubtful that two such fighters can go through six rounds without a knockout.

In the Harrington and McCarthy bout, the slugging Harrington will meet another slugger who is pre-argued as a boxer also. Harrington has the kick of a mule in either hand and if McCarthy lets Harrington land the fight will be over. If McCarthy is clever enough to keep away the fight may come under the head of experience as far as Harrington is concerned.

In the curtain raiser, Babe Lightfoot is going up against the unknown quantity in Richard Scott. Scott has never fought here but has had experience and is scheduled to make things interesting for the local boy.

Some Klamath loggers are scheduled to walk out of town if Gorman fails to do his stuff in the headliner. Best, heavy ones, have been offered on the big boy and it is significant to note that they have been eagerly snapped up by local sportsmen, the latter said to be basing their stand on three things, first, that Olson was ill from poor food in the fight with Stramaglia, second, that his speed is superior to Gorman's, third, that Olson has fought—and beaten—some of the best big men in California.

Carlson will be remembered by local fans as the last-minute substitute who mixed with Harrington here last summer, the result being a liberal education for Harrington, who tried to rush Carlson off his feet. Carlson has had worlds of experience since that time and should be better.

Ben Dixon will referee all fights. His performance at the last card has evidently made him a permanent fixture.

Dewey Webb will do the announcing and is understood to have earnestly promised that he will look over the names on the card before he does his stuff.

Johnny Carlson is bringing a crowd with him from Ashland, his home town. For some reason, this card is drawing a bigger out-of-town house than any this summer.

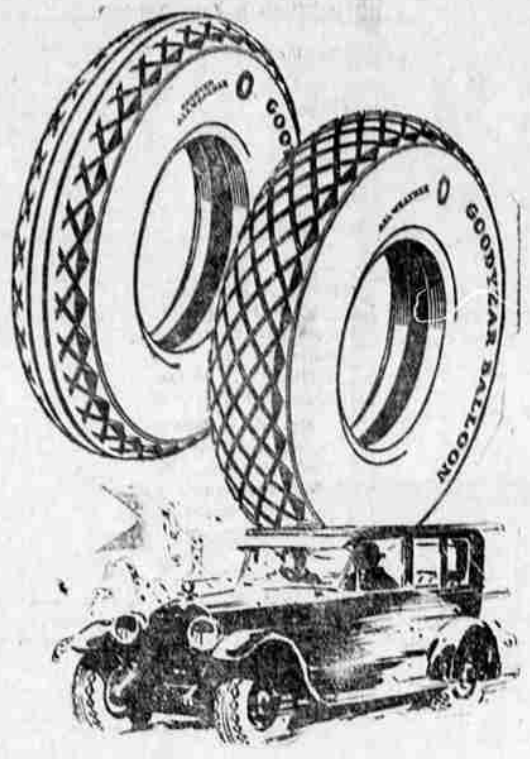
