No More Waivers Will Be Granted On Income Taxes

SALEM, Ore., June 2.—The state tax commission yesterday voted that after June 4 no more waivers will be granted on penalty and interest on delinquent state income taxes under the act of 1923, now repealed. Under an act of the 1925 legislature penalty and interest were waived up to and including June 4.

It is estimated that in delinquent taxes, penalty, interest and corporate dividends over \$500,000 remains yet to be collected. About \$250,000 has been collected since the first of the year, and the total collected under the 1923 act is now about \$2,020,000. Taxes on corporate dividends are now being collected under a supreme court decision holding that these could not be deducted from the taxed returns of corporations.

Early Pioneer Of State Passes Away

ROSEBURG, Ore., June 2.—Simon R. Lane, son of Joseph R. Lane, the first territorial governor of Oregon, died here yesterday at the age of 93 years. Mr. Lane was born in Indiana, February 29, 1832, and came to Oregon in 1853, following his father's first term in congress. Soon after his arrival he entered the mercantile business, being located in Winchester, Roseburg and Umatilla Landing successively between the years of 1854 and 1864. In the latter year he retired from business. He took up the pursuit of agriculture, operating the old Lane ranch east of Roseburg until 1901.

County To Gain By Re-Cruise Of Timber Stands

More than 400,000,000 feet of Klamath county timber, uncruised for 15 years, is not now on the tax lists of the county, according to preliminary estimates of Edgar and Gillison, timber cruisers, who have been making a survey of the situation for the county court.

The above figure is based on the fact that with only one-seventh of the timber area of the county cruised a little more than 66,000,000 feet has been found on which no taxes are being paid, according to the cruisers. This discrepancy is all due to growth within the past 15 years, since the last cruise was taken, it is said.

About 85,000 acres yet remain to be cruised. In the 15,000 acres cruised, it was found that pine beetles had damaged a little more than 4,000,000 feet.
