In the final, Sammy Olson slashed, slugged and uppercut Jim Firpo Gorman whenever and wherever he felt like it. Gorman went down several times but only because he fell over his own feet. Outside of one or two wild swings during the whole performance he offered no aggressive action.

Has Iron Jaw

His iron jaw performance made Olson's ability as a puncher look bad, but then it has made other fighters look worse. The scrapbooks show that in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Gorman stood up under 15 pounds of similar punishment at the hands of Frank Farmer, defying every effort of that veteran to put him out. Olson, up against the same proposition, did his best but it is doubtful if anyone will ever knock Gorman out unless the Marquis of Queensbury rules be changed to allow the use of horse-shoes in the glove.

Gorman might win future fights if he could insist that they go 20 rounds. No opponent could stand and hit him for that length of time without tiring and then if Gorman could still see he might be able to sneak one across.

Joe Coffman Wins

Joe Coffman won a home here on the previous card by his performance in knocking out Jack Crim and last night he still further clinched a place on the hearth by decisively outpointing Johnny Carlson for every round of their six-round argument. Carlson was touted to beat Coffman, due to his greater experience. Instead, Coffman slugged rings around him. Carlson was on the defense from beginning to end, a thing which saved his jaw. Coffman looked to be in far better condition than Carlson.

Helmo Meyers also won himself

a permanent home here in his fight with Harrington. Both fighters started like buzz saws, Meyers boring in and receiving one on the chin that put him down for the count of eight. Undaunted, he tore in again and met with more of the same, being knocked down twice more and seeming to like it.

Harrington Beaten

In the second round he proved that he did like it by coming back for more with a rush—a rush that was eagerly greeted by Harrington. The fans were on their feet during this round and rose again at the third when Meyers shifted gears and put on more speed than before. Harrington likewise cut loose and they mixed. When the smoke of battle cleared away Harrington was listening to the birdies which sang to him long after the count of ten. From the standpoint of sheer willingness to fight, coupled with gameness, both boys furnished enough thrills for three ordinary cards.

Lightfoot Shows Class

The preliminary bout on a fight card is supposed to be more or less of a time killer. The Lightfoot-Scott four-round go was anything but that.

Lightfoot, up against a boy touted to put him to sleep in about three rounds, cut loose and put up the best fight of his career. He took the offensive in every round and the draw decision at the close was very unpopular with the fans. Lightfoot was fully 100 per cent better than in any previous appearance. The whole four rounds were devoted entirely to fighting, fancy footwork and skilled boxing being forgotten.

The result of this bout was somewhat of a surprise to the wise ones. Scott was brought here to wipe up the earth with Lightfoot and his failure to do so only succeeded in making things look rosier for the local boy.

A nearly-full house attended the bouts and a continuation of such cards by Matchmaker Brownie can have only one result—that standing room only will be available in future.
