CONFESSES MURDER

AUGUSTA, Maine, June 4. (A.P.)—Precautions are being taken to prevent Harry A. Kirby, confessed murderer from killing himself. Through the bars of his cell in the county jail here yesterday he admitted to County Attorney Southard that he strangled to death Miss Aida Hayward, shot her aunt, Mrs. Emma M. Towns, and then set fire to their cottage at Lake Maanacook, Winthrop, Maine the night of May 19, Kirby after the confession threatened to commit suicide.

Wrestlers to Stage Match Next Monday Night for Benefit of Klamath Falls Baseball Club

Two wrestlers of known ability are going to stage a finish bout at Moose hall next Monday night, the proceeds to go to the Klamath Falls baseball club. The bone-crushers are Pete Buzukos, former welterweight champion of the world, and Henry Burke, Klamath middleweight.

Buzukos has taken on a little weight during recent years and will wrest through the ropes at 155 pounds, he said today. Burke will be the scales at 160.

Despite the slight disadvantage in weight, Buzukos thinks he can take the measure of the Klamath grappler, and a torrid session should result. The Moose lodge arranged the bout but has agreed to donate the proceeds to the ball club. Members of the team and their friends will aid in the ticket sales, and thus insure a big crowd for the match.

"If Buzukos insists, I will put up my Pacific coast championship belt," said Burke today. "However, this is a matter which can be settled later. I realize I am going up against one of the most experienced wrestlers in the business, but feel that with the little weight advantage plus my condition, I will be able to toss him two out of three falls." A good preliminary will be arranged later in the week.

Dempsey Agrees To Fight Winner

NEW YORK, June 4. (A. P.)—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, today cabled Billy Gibson, manager of Gene Tunney, that he would meet the winner of the Tunney-Gibbons match in "proper inducements were offered." The cablegram reads: "Will positively meet the winner of the Tunney-Gibbons bout if proper inducements are offered. We both are enjoying the trip immensely. Thanks for the good wishes. Fighters To Get Big Pay For Bout

NEW YORK, June 4. (A. P.)—Payment on a basis of more than \$4,400 a minute will be made Gene Tunney and Tommy Gibbons for their 15 round heavyweight battle tomorrow night at the Polo grounds, if the bout goes the limit, it is stated.

The advance seats of tickets indicated an attendance of 60,000 and receipts of \$400,000. Thirty per cent will be the share of Gibbons, giving him \$120,000 or \$8,000 for each three minute round. Tunney's share will be \$80,000, representing 20 per cent of the receipts or more than \$5,333 per round.

The fighters are resting today after a month's preparation for the fight.

Ownership of Island Issue

SALEM, June 4.—That the question of whether the state of Oregon or the federal government is the rightful owner of Sand Island, in the mouth of the Columbia river, will be determined in court became certain yesterday when the state land board granted to the Columbia River Packers Association a lease to the fishing rights of the island. The state is to receive 50 per cent of the proceeds of the fishing operations.

Since 1864, the federal government has had control of the island and has leased out the fishing rights. In that year the state ceded the island to the government the terms being that it be used for military purposes. It never has been used for military purposes, hence the state's claim that title should now revert to the state. The federal government is expected immediately to start suit against the state, and in this way the title right will be tested. The Barbery Packing company recently received a lease on the island from the government.

If the state wins it is estimated that its returns from the fishing operations will be more than \$50,000 a year.
