Bell Hop Wants \$300 Per Month

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4. (A.P.)—Modern "bell hopping" is a highly specialized "profession" and \$300 a month is a fair salary, it is set forth in a suit filed here by Edward Ennis, a bell hop at the Clark hotel, in an effort to collect \$3600 from Mrs. Helen A. Gibbs, wealthy widow of this city. In an answer filed by attorneys for Mrs. Gibbs, Ennis' claim is characterized as "ridiculous." Ennis said he was engaged by Mrs. Gibbs to work for one year and quit his job as bell hop.

Fight Manager Is Held For Slaying

NEW YORK, June 4. (A.P.)—Harry Siegel, manager for Charlie (Phil) Rosenberg, world's bantam-weight boxer, K. O. Phil Kaplan and other pugilists, arraigned in homicide court today charged with shooting Charles Dunton to death, this morning was admitted to \$5000 bail.

Through his attorney Siegel said he shot Dunton in self defense. He asserted Dunton recently was released from Sing Sing prison.

Reprieve Granted To Gerald Chapman

HARTFORD, Conn., June 4. (A.P.)—A reprieve from execution for Gerald Chapman from June 25 to December 3 was issued today by Governor John H. Trumbull on the application of states attorney Hugh M. Alcorn. Chapman was convicted at the March term of the superior court of the murder of Policeman Skelly in New Britain and after a sensational trial was sentenced by Judge Jennings to be hanged at the State prison on June 25.

 Four storm deaths in Nebraska.
 One storm death in Montana.
 Five bathing fatalities in Milwaukee.

Secretary Weeks Is Better Today

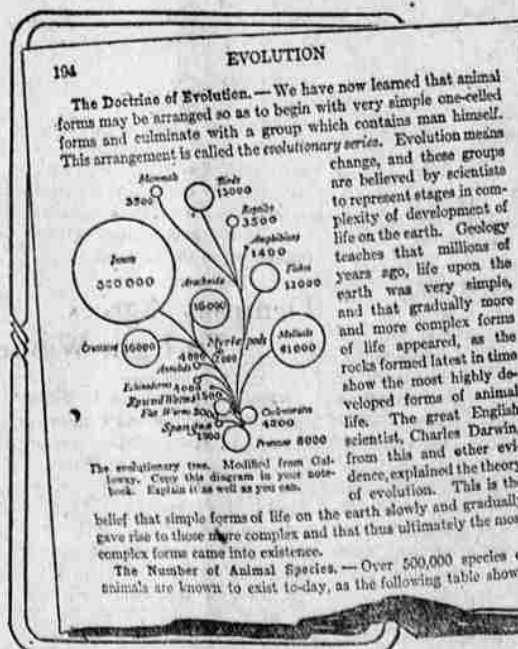
Secretary of War Shows Slight Improvement Over Yesterday

BOSTON, June 4. (AP)—Secretary of War John W. Weeks, who has been in a critical condition at the Massachusetts general hospital, since an operation for gallstones there a week ago, passed the best night he has had since Saturday, according to a bulletin early today from his physicians.
 "Secretary Weeks had the best night he has had since Saturday" said the bulletin, "his condition while not quite so good at 10 o'clock last night as at 7 o'clock, has again changed slightly for the better. Temperature and pulse normal."
