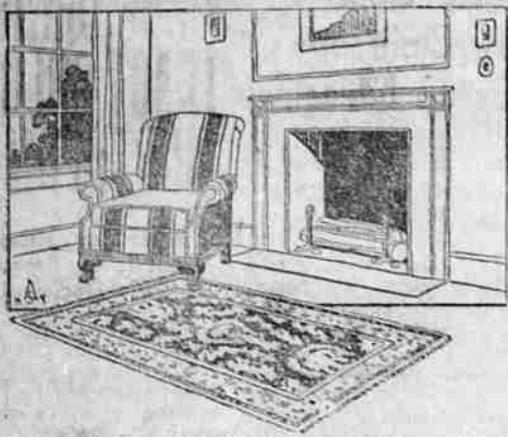

Relay Races to Be Staged Here

Rodeo at Fair Grounds July 2, 3, 4 Promises Big Events

A few thrilling relay races will be provided spectators at the annual rodeo to be held here July 2, 3, and 4. If the tentative plans of the Bly Rodeo association are carried out.

Officers of the organization are now in correspondence with owners of relay strings and hope to receive favorable replies within a short time.

The Bly association after several weeks of negotiations, has decided to stage the annual rodeo on its own initiative, and the merchants of Klamath Falls have agreed to keep their places of business closed from 1 to 5 each afternoon.

Some of the best riders of the west will be here to compete in the bucking contests and other events, and with purses offered equal to many of the larger round-ups, the Bly association expects the rodeo this year to be a winner from start to finish.

J. J. Miller has been appointed publicity manager by the association and is now aiding in lining up the numerous attractions which are expected to draw people here from all parts of the Pacific coast.

News Of The Klamath Country

Merrill High Notes

The school year just passed has been a very successful one in regard to athletics in Merrill High.

Of the four major sports taken part in by the school, three were clean cut victories for Merrill.

Last fall the soccer team went through its schedule without a single defeat winning each of both games from Henley, Klamath Falls and Malin. There were no marked individual stars in these games but consistent team work overcame all opposition.

In basketball we suffered but two defeats, once at Medford and once from Klamath Falls, the Falls game being lost by a close score of 16 to 17. The third game played at Pelican City demonstrated the superiority of the Merrill boys over Klamath and won for us the Glover cup for county championship.

In baseball we failed to win, owing largely to the late start due to the prolonged basketball season.

But in the track and field meet Merrill got back to form and won with a total of 67 points against our nearest competitor's 45. A silver loving cup was the trophy of this event, thus making us two cups won for track, Merrill having won the county field and track meet last year.

Throughout all our athletic activities the boys have shown a spirit of cooperation and sacrifice of personal gain for team work, which accounted in no small part for our victories.

Our victories are largely due to the splendid coaching of Mr. Hendrickson, who showed himself thoroughly capable of meeting every situation. Merrill feels fortunate indeed, to be able to get his services for next year.

On the whole the prospects for next year look very bright for Merrill in athletics, and if the merchants show the same helpful spirit of cooperation that they did this year, and we know they will, Merrill ought to do as good or even better than the past year.

Our new Community Hall with its added gymnasium facilities will be a great help, as the basketball team was somewhat handicapped when they met teams who had a larger floor to play on.

But handicaps are no deterrent to a team determined to win as Merrill has shown by her victories.

Determination to make upper Klamath Lake the trout producing center of Oregon for eastern brook and rainbows has been reached by the state, was announced here last night by M. L. Ryckman, state superintendent of fish hatcheries.

Ryckman made the statement at an informal meeting of the Klamath Sportsmen's association.

He said he would advocate abandonment of small hatcheries in various parts of the state and that he would recommend establishment of much larger egg-taking stations here.
