### MORE HOMES NEEDED

If the chamber of commerce desires to do something worth-while and constructive in aiding the steady growth and development of the city and county it could well devote its time and talents toward relieving the present shortage of dwelling houses; a shortage which promises to grow more acute during the passing months.

Other Oregon cities have made home building a civic project with considerable success, and in some of these cities the need of more homes and the growth were not so marked as they are right here in Klamath Falls.

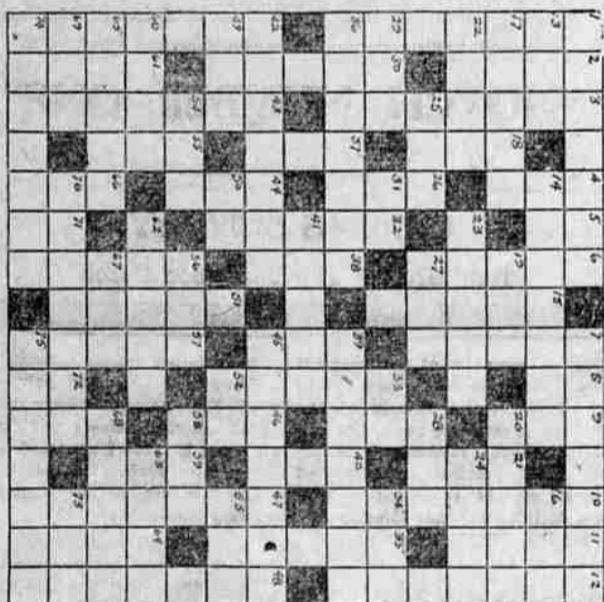
We have in mind a particular city slightly smaller than Klamath Falls. A couple of years ago it saw a miniature tent city spring up almost over night because of the influx of people who went there to rear their homes.

Taking cognizant of the serious situation, the chamber of commerce organized a home-building association. There was no thought of big profits. It built modest homes and sold them on liberal payments to the workingmen who wanted to settle down and live there permanently. This civic enterprise in no way competed with private builders and contractors, for the shortage of dwelling houses was so great that they could not be constructed speedily enough.

Real estate men tell us there are nearly a dozen calls right now for every vacant house. Klamath Falls is enjoying a daily increase in population. The railroads will bring thousands here during the next few years.

The present condition is serious enough to warrant some definite action. Who will take the lead in this needed project?

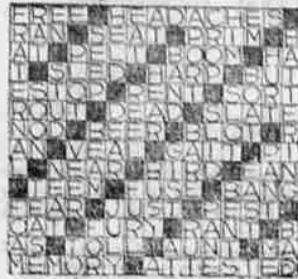

SEATTLE, June 3, (AP)—Georges Gatteau, grandson of Georges Clemenceau, the Tiger of France, is an automobile salesman in Seattle. He is a son of Andre and Therese Clemenceau Gatteau.

Gatteau was personal secretary to his grandfather, the Tiger of France, until he joined the French army in 1915. He served in many major engagements near Verdun.

After the war, Gatteau narrated, he spent an inheritance of more than a million francs in gambling resorts in Western and Southern Europe. When his money was gone, he worked his way to Singapore, back to Paris, to New Orleans, Boston, Central and South America and Seattle. Here he has taken out first papers to become an American citizen.
