OREGON TRUNK RAILROAD BUYS TERMINAL SITE HERE

(Continued From Page One)

RIVAL ROAD HEMMED IN

The failure of the Southern Pacific company to purchase this property before puts it in a very awkward position. As will be seen from the accompanying map, its main line will be in the center of the yards and shops of the Oregon Trunk and makes it impossible to expand its trackage in the most desirable territory in the city. It joins and dominates the three big operations in Klamath Falls district—the Ewauna Box company, the Shaw-Bertram plant and what is generally conceded will be the Shevlin-Hixon operation.

SPURS AVAILABLE

Under the system maintained by Mr. Eberlein, rights-of-way for spurs will be at the service of the Oregon Trunk that will enable that company to reach every part of the territory from close to the Mills Addition school to the Weyerhaeuser mill site. The ground included in these rights-of-way, even where they cross the tracks of the Southern Pacific and O. C. & E. railroads, as well as through private property, has never been decided by Mr. Eberlein and it rests entirely within his power to permit the tracks of the Oregon Trunk to be laid thereon. Only through such remarkable foresight on the part of Mr. Eberlein has it been possible for the Oregon Trunk to enter this city or to make it available to the various industries that are sure to come by reason of the entrance of this city into Klamath Falls.

STRATEGICAL POINT

The purchase of this property is indicative of what may be expected as to the location of the depot, freight houses, etc. Leading from this site, over property owned and controlled by the Enterprise Land and Investment company—which means C. W. Eberlein, as he is the owner of all of the stock of this company—are rights-of-way that can easily place the terminal property in the vicinity of Sixth street. In view of the great development that will follow the coming of the Oregon Trunk, Shevlin-Hixon, Weyerhaeuser and the myriad small factories that follow in the wake of these great enterprises, the location of the depot and freight houses on Eberlein property would not remove it far from the center of the great city that will spring up here, if the Interstate Commerce commission grants it the right to build to Klamath Falls.

If the depot and freight houses were placed on the property east of Mills addition, where the ranch house now stands, it could be reached without crossing any of the tracks of the Southern Pacific or any other railroad and still be close enough to the business district and manufacturing plants as not to be inconveniently located.

BIG NEWS FOR KLAMATH

The announcement that the Oregon Trunk has purchased this property must not be taken as a certainty that it is coming here. It just means that it has availed itself of the opportunity to buy terminal property when it could get it. It means that the people in Klamath county and Northern California must redouble their efforts to see that the Interstate Commerce Commission understands that they want another line; that the new business to be created by reason of its coming will justify its construction and if it does not come, it will mean the prevention of the rapid and economical development of the great agricultural and timber resources of this territory.
