It is declared to be one of the speediest as well as one of the most inexpensive methods of combating the squirrel menace and the present time, due to the recent rains, is said to be practically favorable for its use.

Prison Physician Thinks Young Dick Loeb Will Be Raving Maniac in Prison

JOHNET, Ill., June 6. (AP)—Richard Loeb, the master mind who plotted, with Nathan Leopold, the murder of Bobby Franks last year has suffered a mental breakdown and is in a state, that according to his doctors, will improve or terminate fatally within 48 hours.

"Dickie" suffering from a severe attack of mania that weakened him mentally and physically, has lasted for two days and nights on his cot in the old prison hospital here. Since Tuesday, when he became violent and hurled objects at his guards, he has raved and sobbed.

"Buddy, I want Buddy," he cried repeatedly, also calling for his mother.

"Dickie" was taken to mean "Patience" Reinhart, Leopold and Loeb's girl companion, in the days before they killed young Franks and were sentenced to prison for life.

If Loeb does recover from the maniac attack, he may face a life of insanity, it was indicated by Dr. Herman Adler, state criminologist, who reported that the youth is in a "Post-infectious delirium."

Dr. Adler is convinced that Dick is not feigning his illness.

Leopold does not know of his accomplice's collapse. He is recovering after an operation for appendicitis and it was feared news of Loeb's condition would harm him.

Klamath Student Wins High Honor
