

SOLON HELD FOR CONTEMPT; ALSO FOR DRUNKENNESS

John W. Langley, Kentucky Congressman, in Lime-light Once More

IS ORDERED TO JAIL

Fiery Legislator Already Faces Prison Sentence on Federal Charge

PIKEVILLE, Ky., June 10.—Released early this morning after serving a jail sentence of 10 hours and payment of a fine of \$10 both for contempt of court, Congressman John W. Langley, republican, Kentucky, will face a charge of drunkenness today before Police Judge J. P. Marra, who heard the charge in part yesterday and who sentenced him for contempt of court.

Judge Marra fined the representative \$10, when Mr. Langley, with an oath, declared that whoever swore out the warrant against him swore to a lie. The judge considered additional oaths in denial of the charge as further contempt of court, and ordered him imprisoned for 10 hours. Mr. Langley's jail sentence officially was at a close at 2 a. m. this morning. A deputy sheriff in making the arrest said he found Mr. Langley only partly clothed in a downtown building.

Mr. Langley has been in the public eye on numerous occasions in the last year, most of which dealt with federal indictments against him for alleged withdrawal of liquor from government warehouses. He was convicted on one of the charges and faces an Atlanta federal prison sentence. Recently his deposition was taken here on a similar charge to be heard in Washington in a few months. He also was arrested on a charge of drunkenness in Washington, where a woman police lieutenant swore out a warrant against him.

Owens Valley Farmers Anxious to Migrate Here to Langell Valley

AWAIT SETTLEMENTS

Just as Soon as Sales Are Made, They Want to Leave California

(Special Correspondence) LANGELL VALLEY, June 10.—Word has been received from Sam Head, who is now in Owens Valley, that the interest of the farmers in that section is still very keen in Langell Valley. The city of Los Angeles has just voted \$8,000,000 to be used in buying out the farmers of the Owens river valley and when settlement is made they will be ready to seek new homes, according to Mr. Head's letter.

No section that has been investigated has met with the same degree of approval as that accorded Langell valley and it is Mr. Head's belief that a large number of the farmers may be induced to come to that section and buy. The one difficulty now confronting the project is the fact that the options that Mr. Head holds will expire early in July and that will not allow of sufficient time to carry to completion the big project of migration that he hopes to put over. In the letter written by Mr. Head to people in the valley, he asks for an extension of the options so as to give him the needed time to carry through his plans.

At a meeting which is to be held in the community hall next Saturday evening, this question of the extension of the options will be discussed and likely voted upon.

Another matter that will engage the attention of those present will be the big barbecue to be held in celebration of the opening of the headgates of the big canal. This celebration will be held a week from next Sunday. Everything is going to be free and everyone will be welcome.

Man Refuses Aid To Drowning Boy

Coroner's Jury in Canada Says He is Negligent and Undesirable

SEATTLE, June 10.—A Canadian press dispatch received here today said after witnesses testified that George Schrader, Elmwood, Manitoba, had refused use of his boat to attempt to rescue Robert Beck 13, drowned in the Red river Saturday a coroner's jury yesterday held Schrader negligently responsible for the boy's death and expressed the opinion that his conduct was such as to make him an undesirable citizen.

The boy's mother pleaded with Schrader for the use of the boat, but was refused, testimony revealed. She said while the lad was drowning, Schrader told her "I have told the boys many times to keep away from the river. They take no notice, and I don't care if they drown."

Idaho Land To Be Sold At Auction

WASHINGTON, June 10.—Sale by public auction of 15,890 acres of land located in the former Coeur d'Alene Indian reservation in Idaho was authorized today by the secretary of the interior. The sale will be held at Coeur d'Alene on October 5, in tracts ranging from 30 to 160 acres. Any coal or oil deposit that might be found on the land will be reserved by the government.

PERMIT SOUGHT TO BUILD MODOC NORTHERN ROAD

SOUTHERN PACIFIC APPLIES TO INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION

(Special to The Herald) SAN FRANCISCO, June 10.—Another move in the Klamath rail battle was reported made here today when the Southern Pacific company is said to have made application with the interstate commerce commission for a certificate of convenience and necessity to build the Modoc Northern line.

Whether or not the company intends building the line south for through connections was not learned, as it was indicated that the Southern Pacific preferred to let the interstate commerce commission make public their application from Washington.

That the Southern Pacific would file such an application was considered a certainty here inasmuch as surveyors are now relocating this line through the Merrill and Malin country. Local officials also were silent as to the scope of the application said to have been filed.

The former scale of wages for union men was \$7 a day. Approximately 25 men are affected by the walkout.

ALLEGED SLAYER OF SPOUSE HELD ON \$3000 BONDS

Omar W. Murphy, Medford Indicted for Alleged Killing of Wife

DIES AFTER BEATING

Manslaughter Bill Returned —Others Held For Various Offenses

MEDFORD, Ore., June 10.—Omar W. Murphy, charged with manslaughter, as the result of an alleged beating administered to his wife on April 1, and whose preliminary hearing has been postponed twice, has been indicted by the grand jury, on the preferred charge. He is at liberty on \$3,000 bonds.

Besides the indictment of Murphy, the grand jury, which convened Tuesday, returned four other true bills.

F. M. White, a farmer living between Jacksonville and Gold Hill, was indicted for possession of a still and possession of mash. White was arrested in a raid on his place Monday night by the sheriff's office and federal prohibition officers.

A fifteen gallon capacity still, three quarts of finished product and forty gallons of mash were seized. According to Sheriff Jennings, White admitted ownership and possession and said he "was selling what he could not drink himself."

T. E. Eddy, a junk man, arrested a year ago in connection with dog poisoning was indicted on a statutory charge involving a ten year old Gold Hill girl.

Merrill Betts was indicted on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated.

(A.P.)—Secretary Work and Dr. Elwood Mead, commissioner of the bureau of reclamation will leave Friday for a trip through the northwest to investigate reclamation projects, Indian reservations and national parks. Their itinerary includes Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Washington, Oregon and Idaho. They will return to Washington July 21.

This trip, it was pointed out, will complete the inspection of the department of interior's project in the west by the secretary and commissioner who previously toured the southwest. The inspection is made to obtain first hand information of conditions in the west and obtain local view points with the idea of improving the addition of the department's undertakings.
