RISE TO PAR OF POUND STERLING TO HELP MARKET

Lumber Division Chief Says Better Exchange Will Stimulate Buying

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The return of the pound sterling to par is likely to result in somewhat freer buying of lumber in ratio at least to the better British rate of exchange, says J. C. Nellis, assistant chief of the lumber division of the department of commerce. Discussing sterling parity and British lumber buying, Mr. Nellis continues: "A greater increase in lumber purchases may be expected by reason of the strengthened financial position allowing construction developments even larger than so far proposed. Further industrial demand should similarly increase. However, the United Kingdom is the focus of world lumber shipments and gets its supplies of lumber from a dozen or more of countries. The greater part of three billion feet imported each year are softwoods. These woods come from northern and eastern Europe and North America. There is a surplus of softwood lumber this year in northern Europe. Eastern Canada is looking to the United Kingdom to replace the market in the United States lost to Pacific coast woods. These and other countries will make every effort to increase their sales to the United Kingdom this year. Our softwood exporters therefore may expect keen competition except in exclusive United States grades or sizes. Our hardwood exporters may expect continued competition with European and Japanese hardwoods. Our exporters of specialties, such as doors and plywood may expect European producers to seek British business more than ever."

Scenery Seen As Settler's Lure

That Oregon, in need of more settlers, has within her borders wonders that would draw people here from all sections of the world was the contention of Professor J. B. Horner of the history department of O. A. C., noon speaker at today's forum luncheon. Horner devoted his talk to a recital of the wonders to be found in Klamath county and in the state at large. He told of the geological history of the state and of evidences that this section in ages past had had both a tropical and a frigid climate, at widely varying times. "Oregon needs more people and if sufficient publicity were given these matters the people would come," he declared. "The trouble with us here is that wonders are so commonplace as to excite no comment and we neglect to tell the outside world about them." Professor Horner, under the guidance of Captain O. C. Applegate, will spend the next three days in an exploration of various points of interest in this county. The expeditions will leave Merrill promptly at 7:00 o'clock each morning and anyone wishing to accompany them was extended an invitation to do so by Horner. Bobbed hair is all right. INCOME TAX BEING PAID

SALEM, Ore., June 10.—Since June 4, when waivers of penalty and interest on delinquent income taxes ceased, the total collected under the income tax act of 1923, now repealed, has mounted rapidly, and has now reached approximately \$2,325,000. At the time the law was enacted it was estimated the act would yield \$1,250,000. Last week alone nearly \$400,000 was received, of which \$356,000 was turned over to the state treasurer. Some turnovers have not yet been made by the tax commission. One big corporation alone remitted an additional \$56,000. While some of the receipts represent fourth installment payments by the tax payers and sources uncovered by field investigations, by far the most of it is a result of the supreme court opinion holding that corporations are to be taxed on their dividends, while taxes paid by individuals on their dividends from corporations are to be refunded. The refunds to individuals, in the opinion of Earl Fisher, state tax commissioner, will not be more than one-third of the taxes on dividends paid by corporations. Refunds to individuals are to be deducted from the \$400,000 received last week and will slightly cut down the approximate total of \$2,325,000. The additional payments now coming in from corporations on account of dividends will, according to State Treasurer Kay, cut down considerably the deficit to be faced by the state during the present biennium.
