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THE LAW OF WAGES

You can go to the very top, and going down the scale you can find men who will not work of themselves and no one can make them work, and so their lives are worth nothing and they are a tax and burden on the community.

AIR PATROL TO START WORK ON FIRST OF JULY

Eugene Will be Nearest Airplane Base to Klamath Falls

Airplane forest fire patrol will start on July 1, with bases at Eugene, Oregon; Vancouver and Spokane, Washington; and Mather Field and Ross Field, California, according to announcement made today by the district forester's office, Portland, Oregon. Ten planes will be assigned to the five bases, and will be available for the forested regions of Oregon, Washington, California, Montana and Idaho.

Plans do not contemplate regular patrol, but rather the use of the planes for special flights during for reconnaissance work on large periods of great fire danger, and fires. At the request of the war department and in active cooperation with the air service of the U. S. army, the forest service will supervise all forest air patrol activities.

The patrol is made possible, it is said, through the efforts of Senator McNary of Oregon and other western state and private forestry associations and interests, whereby a congressional appropriation of \$50,000 was made available for the work this season. State and private forestry interests are also said to be cooperating in financing the project.

Air patrol has proved its value as an auxiliary of other methods of forest protection, according to foresters and timbermen, and they approve its reestablishment by the federal government for the protection of our forested areas.

Clark-McNary Act Gives \$30,380 To State Of Oregon. SALEM, Oregon—State Forester F. A. Elliott received word from Portland Thursday morning that Oregon had been allotted \$30,380 of federal funds under the terms of the Clark-McNary law passed at the last session of congress and authorizing an annual appropriation of not to exceed \$2,500,000 to be allotted the various states to assist them in forest protection. In order to qualify for any of the funds a state must have a fire prevention and suppression system that will adequately protect both timbered and cut over lands. The law is intended to cover only state and private lands and does not apply to the national forests. These federal funds will be used in the payment of salaries of field inspectors who are now working under the direction and supervision of the state forester's office, and also in the employment of additional patrolmen in the various districts throughout the state.
