CHICAGO, June 11.—(A.P.)—Edward Dean, a veteran policeman, today defended \$9000, receipts of the Chicago Motor Coach company, at the probable cost of his life.

Struck in the stomach by slugs from a sawed-off shot gun and wounded in the leg by a revolver bullet, Dean chased four masked robbers from the company's office and fired six shots at them before he fainted from his wounds.

In another fight with robbers, James Maynard, a patrolman, killed a negro burglar just as the latter was about to fire on Maynard's police partner in the hallway of a South Side building.

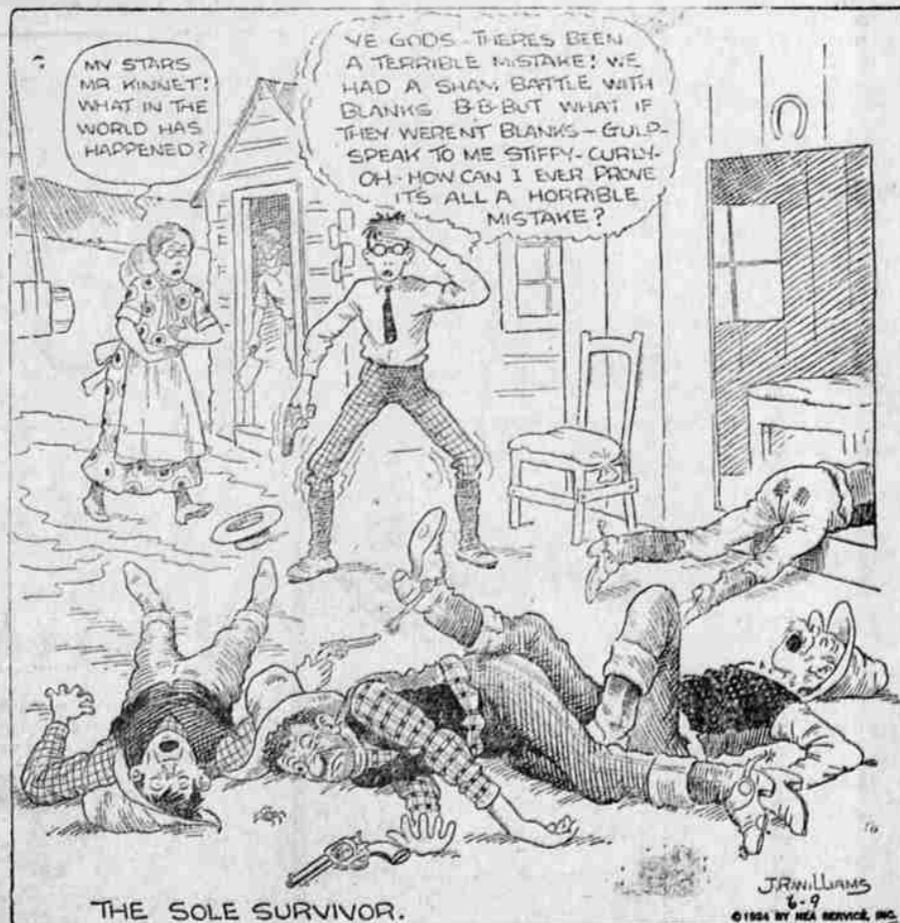

LOCOMOTIVES BEAR NAMES OF WELL KNOWN HORSES

LONDON, (AP)—The London and North Eastern Railway has revived a custom of the old stage coach days, when every coach had its name, and now gives every locomotive a title instead of a number.

The first of a series will be named for well known race horses, some of the new locomotives being labelled "Flying Fox," "Ormonde," "Hermit," "Ladas," "Permisson," "Robert le Diable," "Donovan," "Doncaster," and other notable runners of the turf.

The Southern Railway also has adopted the idea, naming its engines for well known men. "His Majesty," the largest locomotive on the line is one, and "The Prince of Wales," another.

Every locomotive in the passenger service throughout the country soon will have its name and in time none but the little freight yard switching engines will be known by numbers.

Short Time Lease Will Be Opposed

WASHINGTON, June 11. (A.P.)—Opposition to any short time lease of the power facilities at Muscle Shoals was expressed by the president's Muscle Shoals commission in a letter transmitted today to the war department.
