Commission Orders Revision Of Rates

WASHINGTON, June 12—(A.P.)—The I. C. C. today ordered a revision of rates on grain, grain products and hay from numerous points in Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma to points in the southeast and the lower Mississippi. October eighth was named as the effective date for the changes.

Points of origin affected are on the Oregon Short Line and its connections and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific. The rate structures involve in many cases, it was held, the charging of higher rates for short hauls than is charged for long hauls over the same line and in the same direction.

In the rate readjustment laddered will be given to the railroads and they may rectify the long and short haul violation either by raising the long haul rates or decreasing the short haul rates, or both.
