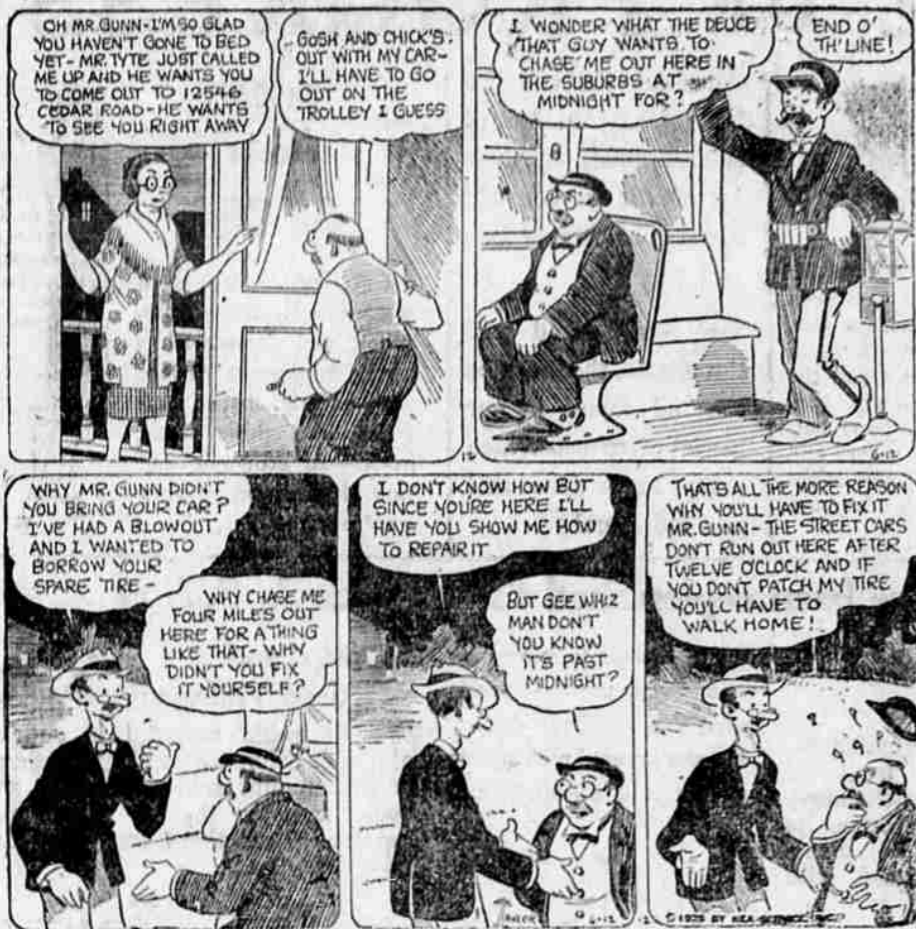

Five Drowned in Boat Wreck

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 12. (A.P.)—Five persons are believed to have been drowned last night when an explosion, followed by fire, destroyed the pleasure boat "Crystal," forcing 30 persons, including the crew, to leap overboard while on a pleasure cruise eight miles off Atlantic City.

The explosion is believed to have been caused by a cigarette end thrown down a hatchway.

The body of Deborah McKnight, 18, was brought ashore by coast guards, while a patrol boat is continuing the search for John Hanum of Northfield, Warren Dikes of Linwood, Joseph Wilson of Northfield, and Martha Weiss, still missing.

A "dry navy" boat rescued 11 others.

Captain William Young, commander of the craft, is held in \$2000 bail pending an investigation.

Curtis Lyle of Northfield, a passenger, said the merry-makers were singing and dancing on the top deck when the explosion occurred.

"There was a terrific blast—like a crack of thunder banging right into your ears," he said. "The boat seemed to heave right up off the sea. She rolled from side to side, long, sickening rolls that threw us around, and in a moment, when we got to our feet, I found myself on the top deck. I must have been blown out of the cabin.

"The boat gave an awful lurch and I saw two of the life boats go spinning into the ocean. The next thing I knew most of us were floundering around in the water."

CHINESE STRIKE RENEWED AGAIN

SHANGHAI, June 12. (AP)—Fifteen thousand Chinese mill workers who had struck and later returned to work walked out again tonight.

The recurrence of the strike was considered an immediate result of the sharp disorders at Hankow, interior port, where nearly a dozen have been killed in a series of riots.
